July 2 • God Won't Give You More Than You Can Handle

Jesus Never Said That

When we read what Paul was telling the Corinthians, we can see that he wasn't trying to tell them that they would only ever get trials and temptations that they could handle. He was telling them, and specifically them: "buck up." They (the Corinthians) aren't experiencing wildly different trials. These tests are regular enough to be common. But we shouldn't expect that this test, or any other, is within our means to handle. We are sinners and are very capable of creating situations that are beyond our ability to navigate. In fact, the very notion of sin puts us into a debt with our LORD that we cannot overcome. Thank God for Jesus and His unending grace. –I Corinthians 10:13

July 9 • That's Not Fair

Bad things happen in the world. When they happen to us, sometimes we can put God on trial. There are also some who decide they will live by their own rules, living by the motto "no one can judge me but God." We don't have the mind of God, which is why you wouldn't want to be judged by Him. He knows all about us. Our thoughts, our words and our deeds. His judgment is much more severe, taking into account every possible outcome. But He gives grace. Grace isn't fair. It is given repeatedly to the point of being ludicrous. Our Lord is not fair, thanks be to God! –Acts 10:34-40; John 7:21-27

July 16 • Everything Happens for a Reason

The problem with this often-recited trope is that it removes personal responsibility. How could we fight against God's will? I guess we should let cancer ravage our bodies. We should let warlords continue pillaging and destroying. This way removes God from the world. He sent His Holy Spirit into the world to guide His people. Not that their free will be limited but rather that they might be harnessed for the good of the Kingdom of God. –Romans 8:28

July 23 • God Helps Those Who Help Themselves

This saying speaks to the American ideal of individualism. That we can pull ourselves up by our bootstraps and in so trying we will be aided by God. This saying is not in the Bible. It could even be interpreted as heretical (Pelagian)! But we still hold onto the idea. We like that we can have control. Our world is full of situations in which we find ourselves hopeless. But the LORD God is God of the hopeless. He sent His son to help precisely because we could not help ourselves. –John 11:38-44; Ephesians 2:1-9

July 30 • Money Is the Root of All Evil

Money is not the problem. Love of money is always a problem. Loving money is loving a thing that would take the place of God. This idolatry leads the wayward to decisions and lifestyle choices that seem reasonable but are, in fact, evil. Money is a tool and a very effective one. It allows for the smooth trade of goods and services so that our society can function, but it is not the goal of a life well lived. We know money has power and we can either use it, which is good and as God intended, or fall into its grasp. –I Timothy 6:6-10; Matthew 6:19-24

August 6 • Listen to Your Heart

If it feels good, do it; if it doesn't, don't. These are the words of wisdom that many hear and think of as truth. Emotion, however, is not truth. Emotions are gifts from God to pay attention to things in our life. To help us experience, recognize and enjoy the events of this gift of life. But they aren't the deciding factor. Imagine if Jesus didn't feel like mounting the cross? What would have happened if the Israelites actually did turn back to Egypt? We are the master of our emotions. God gave us all these as gifts to use; let's make sure we use them well. –Romans 5:1-5

August 13 • Christians Have to Always Be Nice

All Christians are nice, always. Yes. And if you believe that, there's some ocean-front property I want to sell you in Kansas. There is no way a Christian, or anyone else, can be nice all the time. Christians, like everyone else, are allowed to have different emotions. Jesus Himself wept, and overturned tables in anger. What a Christian is supposed to do is not plot against others. We are to seek their well-being and make the concerns of others our concerns. –Ephesians 4:31-32

August 20 • Love the Sinner Hate the Sin

"I love you, but..." The love of God is unconditional. Anything less than unconditional love is not the love of God. We, Christians, are to reflect God's love in the world, and that love is not stipulated. So we love like God loved us. What is more, we can recognize that He loves us with our sin. We don't need to be judgmental about another's sin because we are not perfect ourselves. We don't need to point out those sins which are not socially acceptable. We can love 'em all and let God sort 'em out. –Romans 12:9-18





The Importance of a Small Group by PASTOR RYAN

I miss my small group. We met each week during Wednesdays Together. We started out as a group whose only connection was that we had children of a similar age and we were willing to meet.

We did some book studies. Nothing fancy. Nothing amazing. I lead, but I'm a pastor and it's easy for me to lead; and I didn't pull any rabbits out of any hats. Super basic, super easy, slow pitch softball kind of stuff. We meet at worship or social events and talk about our group. We talk about an event we put on the calendar to all get together. Talk about how there is this void in our lives. Because, well, there is a void. We met almost every week for months. That kind of commitment builds into something meaningful and because the calendar marches forward our patterns changed, but not our needs.

Over and over again we see that God's intention is to bring people together. We are supposed to be together and when one leaves the 99 we reach out and bring that one back in. When one who has gone astray is found back in the fold we celebrate.

There is a deepness about our Lord that transforms us. There is so much that we could have. Blessings on top of blessings. All that is required is to seek first the Kingdom of God. This seeking the Kingdom of God can be a nebulous endeavor. How do we grow? What is the mechanism? How do I know if I'm doing it right?

My advice to you is: get into a small group. Or, start one yourself, if you are advanced in your faith. The time and commitment is real. You have to show up. But that's how it works. That's how everything works. You can't eat a bowl of Cheerios before you go in for your blood work and expect your cholesterol to be lowered. No one has ever paddled a surfboard out into the choppy waves for the first time and began riding a tube. Spiritual growth, like fine wine or a beautiful marriage takes time and commitment. Then, one day you look back and see what goodness has sprung up.

The Lord God is a being who is for others. Our LORD God literally created everything so that we could share in this gift of life. He wants us to be together, serve one another and love each other. Church is where we gather, Small Groups are where we grow.

We will be looking for leaders this summer to start new groups. There is a training for new leaders, or even those veterans who still want to learn more. There is also a mixer where new and veteran small group leaders can get together and learn what was good, bad, and best. There are staff and pastors at Christ Lutheran to help you learn and grow, no matter where you are in your spiritual journey.

Afghan Refugee Resettlement

It's been almost a year since our church and our Afghan Ministry team were blessed to enter into a relationship with the Osmani family. It's definitely been an enlightening and rewarding relationship that has developed over the past months. We've helped Mohammad and Khatera get connected with community services, secure doctors for all of the family members, pursue alternative housing options, and now, we embark on the most daunting task yet, helping Osmani family members in Afghanistan join Mohammad and Khatera here in the U.S.

Not only will this allow for family members to be reunited, but it will give their family members a chance at a life without the fear and violence they face on a regular basis.

Our team has begun the Humanitarian Parole process for Arash Shirzad, one of Khatera's brothers (currently in Turkey). Humanitarian parole is given to those hoping to enter the U.S. under emergency circumstances. While parole allows for temporary lawful presence in the United States, it does not give you immigration status, nor a path to lawful permanent residence (a Green Card), nor other lawful immigration status. Anyone receiving parole will remain an applicant for admission and may be able to apply for lawful status in the United States, if eligible. Parolees can apply for legal status through the asylum process or other forms of sponsorship, if available, once they're in the U.S.

Multiple documents and attestations are part of the Humanitarian Parole application process. One key part of completing the application is securing sponsorship for the beneficiary, Arash. Normally a family member would sponsor the family member trying to gain entry to the U.S. In order for Mohammed and Khatera to sponsor Arash, they would need to make a minimum of \$50,350 per year to qualify. Their annual income is well short of this despite working multiple jobs including a full-time job during the week. An attorney from the International House has kindly donated time to help us get the application started. Now we need to secure a sponsor for Arash. We have learned a lot, yet still have many questions regarding sponsorship. Anyone interested can reach out to Amy Daniels (<u>adaniels@christelca.org</u>) and she can coordinate a meeting to learn more.

Here are the nuts and bolts (provided to us and shared below) of what is required of a sponsor. We may need to schedule a question and answer session in order to gain more clarity for interested individuals. The request for Humanitarian Parole, which involves a temporary stay in the United States, requires the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to determine whether the beneficiary of the request has sufficient financial support to live without concern of becoming reliant on U.S. Government welfare.

A sponsor provides this financial support by submitting a Form I-134. The individual who signs and submits Form I-134 (the sponsor) must establish that he/she has both sufficient financial resources and access to those funds to support the beneficiary for the duration of the beneficiary's stay in the United States. Whether or not the beneficiary will have sufficient means of support while in the United States is an important factor in determining whether to exercise discretion to authorize parole. USCIS requires evidence that the beneficiary has financial support for the duration of his stay in the U.S. Lack of evidence of financial support while in the U.S. is a strong negative factor that may lead to a denial of parole.

The sponsor will be required to verify their immigration status. If the sponsor is a U.S. citizen, this can be a copy of the sponsor's birth certificate or a copy of the biographic data page of a U.S. passport. USCIS may require that the sponsor appear for an interview or provide biometrics (fingerprints, photograph, and/or signature) at any time to verify his/her identity, and may require additional information such as background and security checks before making a decision on the application. The sponsor will be notified if any of the above is needed.

Financial information required from the sponsor:

- Assets that will be used to support the beneficiary for the anticipated period of his stay in the U.S. (only assets that can be converted into cash within 12 months).
- Statement from an officer of the bank or other financial institutions with deposits, identifying the following details regarding the account: date account opened, total amount deposited for the past year and present balance.
- Statement from employer on business stationary showing: date and nature of employment, salary paid and whether the position is temporary or permanent.
- · Copy of last U.S. federal income tax return filed.

Uniting for Ukraine by ELIZABETH MARQUARDT

A few months ago, I was tiptoeing through the grocery store while my infant son napped in his car seat in the cart when suddenly, a stranger grabbed my arm. An elderly woman with a scarf knotted under her chin pulled me over to a BOGO sign and asked, in accented English, "What does this mean?" I stammered an explanation, hoping she would let go before the baby woke up. Later, I wished I had responded with more compassion and offered more help: this woman was not used to shopping in an American supermarket. I suspect she was from Ukraine.

According to Ukrainians of the Carolinas, southeastern Mecklenburg County is home to hundreds of recent immigrants from Ukraine, more than any other part of North Carolina. Many of these people are here because of the federal Uniting for Ukraine (U4U) program, which expedites the humanitarian parole process for



Ukrainians so they can get here in weeks instead of years. Once they arrive, they are eligible to receive the same services as a person with refugee status, with a catch: while a refugee would automatically be connected with a service provider, humanitarian parolees have to seek these services out for themselves. Many recent arrivals don't know what kind of help is available to them.

And that's where we (you?) come in. A number of the recent Ukrainian immigrants in our area were sponsored by other Ukrainian immigrants who arrived here over the past 20-30 years. These people acted quickly to get friends and relatives out of a war zone, but they didn't know how to connect the newcomers with a resettlement agency. We have the opportunity to step into this gap by forming a Circle of Welcome and connecting a family with resources from Lutheran Services of the Carolinas (LSC). LSC helps navigate government programs such as work permits, health insurance and ESL classes. The Circle of Welcome helps a family with needs such as finding donated furnishings, clothing and transportation. They might also accompany a recent arrival to the grocery store for the first time so that they aren't forced to solicit strangers for explanations of American shopping culture (imagine the courage required to do that in a foreign language!).

You can help by:

- Being part of a Circle of Welcome to support our Ukrainian neighbors who are already here (time commitment).
- Providing short-term housing for an individual or family.
- Donating frequent flier miles, credit card points, or money to defray travel expenses for someone coming to the U.S.

If you are interested in any of these opportunities, you can attend one of two informational meetings at Christ Providence on Sunday, July 30 or Sunday, August 6 at 10 a.m. in Forum A&B. You can also email me at <u>marquardt.elizabeth@gmail.com</u>.

Elizabeth serves on our NC Synod Immigration and Refugee Task Force. She has also been involved with our Afghan Refugee Resettlement Task Group. We have the opportunity to do most of the same things for our Afghan family and extended family that would like to escape to the United States.


