A Special Pastor's Perspective







Well Done, Good & Faithful Servant! WELL DONE.

Twenty four years ago, when I was interviewing at Christ Lutheran, I had a chance to meet the staff. Somewhere in the midst of that meet and greet, this mustache wearing, smooth talking, well dressed minister of music posed a question that to this day I'm not sure if it was genuine or a meager attempt to stump this young wannabe pastor looking to be considered for the best ELCA call in the United States.

"What do you want written on your tombstone," Mark Glaeser asked me out of the blue.

Sizing him up, wondering about his motivation, I replied, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Well done."

With an approving nod, he said, "That's the right answer!"

We were both young, trying to figure out ministry together, hoping that we wouldn't mess it up too badly. When Christ Lutheran did extend that call to me in 1998, I knew that the secret to any success that we might achieve together was to forge a deep, lasting friendship with this minister of music that went beyond a professional working relationship.

For twenty four years, we have shared ministry together in the most meaningful and profound ways. We have built buildings together, envisioned worship together and dreamed boldly together. Personally, we have been there for one another from the death of parents to the marriages of our children to the birth of grandchildren. Mark and I have stood next to each other through our own surgeries and those of Gwen and Gretchen. We have vacationed as families together, traveled the world together and attend the same men's small group together. He is one of my closest friends with whom I have shared triumphs and failures, tears and laughter. Outside of my immediate family, Mark knows me better than anyone else.

I may not be alone. Mark is a rare person with whom so many people feel that they have a close, personal relationship. People sing and play music with and for Mark not only because of their own personal love of music, but because Mark has this incredible ability to surround himself with an army of people who want to be with him. He is a magnet.







On May 22, we will honor and celebrate the 32 years of ministry Mark has enjoyed at Christ Lutheran. I hope you put that date on your calendar now and plan to be there. We will have a congregational meal late afternoon including some brats and the fixings (as per Mark's request) and even a beer truck! After dinner, we will assemble in the sanctuary, a fitting space to recognize Mark's ministry since he was the primary point person working with the architect to create that beautiful house of worship.

Thankfully, Mark and Gwen, Kristin, Caleb, Chloe and ??? will remain a part of Christ Lutheran. They are not going anywhere. The more public Minister of Music position, however, will be passed down to Mark Johanson, an incredible musician and minister in his own right. And why not? Johanson was Glaeser's own personal choice as the possible successor. Great choice!

The time has come. His work is complete. His legacy will last for decades to come. And I will be there on May 22 with a grateful heart to hug him, shed a tear and say, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Well done!"



James: Pulling No Punches SUNDAYS | APRIL 24 - MAY 22

One cannot read the book of James without walking away with a couple of bruises. He cuts through the flowery words, skips past the niceties, omits the pleasantries, and hits us between the eyes. "Faith without works is dead." "Tame that tongue of yours." "Don't just be hearers of the word, but doers." Speaking to Easter People who have heard the Gospel, James comes not with a warm embrace but packing a punch.

April 24 • A Jab of Temptation

Let's not blame our shortcomings on temptations, especially suggesting that such temptations come from God. God tempts no one to sin. We are people of Easter. We have been named and claimed by the resurrected Lord. It is time to walk as such. *James 1:5-15; Matthew 5:11-16*

May 1 • A Hook to Partiality

The Bible has this amazing way of leveling the playing field. From janitor to president, in God's sight, we are all equal—equal in need of forgiveness, equal in worth, equal in value. It is a consistent message from Jesus to Paul to James. Show no partiality. *James 2:1-13; Luke 14:12-14*

May 8 • An Uppercut to the Jaw of Grace

The hallmark of the Protestant Reformation was justification by faith alone apart from works of the law. Perhaps that is why Luther called James the "straw epistle." It doesn't mention the resurrection. It only uses Jesus' name twice. And it is so bold as to come right out and say, "A person is justified by works and not by faith alone." In good Lutheran manner we ask, "What does this mean?" *James 1:22, 14-26; Romans 3:19-20, 27-28*

May 15 • A Punch in the Mouth

When we chanted in the school yard that "Sticks and stone may hurt my bones, but names will never hurt me," we never did believe it, did we? Our words have great damaging effect. A tongue is like the small rudder on a boat. It isn't that big, but it can steer the entire vessel. Best to hold onto those reigns tightly. James 3:1-12; Matthew 5:21-22

May 22 • A Combination of Slander, Arrogance & Oaths

James ends with a list of do's and don'ts—making friends with the world, slandering a person, avoiding oaths, praying for others and preventing backsliding.



It is not intended to be an onerus thing to care for one another, but rather the marks of what it means to be in a Christian community. We build up one another to live a life worthy of our calling as people of the Resurrection. *James 4:1-10; Romans 12:1-3; John 17:13-19*

Our Father SUNDAYS | JUNE 12-26

Our God is unimaginable. At the same time both otherworldly and completely familiar. He knows us intimately and regards us a nothing more than passing wildflower, here today gone tomorrow. The paradox that is our Father in Heaven is not that He is unknowable but that there is always more to understand.

June 12 • Intimate Daddy

A good father is in the life of his child. He knows his children, and cares for them. No matter how far afield they go, He welcomes them back. Our Father in Heaven is not God on high and unreachable. He wants to be with us, too. He has sent His Son to bridge the chasm of sin and His Holy Spirit remains. We are not orphaned. We are loved BY A God who is intimate and personal; He knows all about us and loves us dearly. *Matthew* 6:7-15, 1 John 3:1-3

June 19 • Father Who Art In Heaven (transcendent)

Who can know God? His ways are not our ways. No one can see Him; He is not approachable. He is God and we are nothing-- maggot and evanescent grass. His majesty is ineffable, His glory incomparable. God is wholly other. He is the very definition of Holy and is the only One worthy of our praise and adoration. *Isaiah* 55: 6-9, *Matthew 20:1-16*

June 26 • Turning Into Your Father

We all have had to, or will have to, decide if we will accept or reject the proposition of turning into our parents. Will we wear the black socks and sandals of our forefathers with pride or with disdain at what we have become? Our Father in Heaven wants us to be like Him. Endowment Fund News

As a result of gifts to Christ Lutheran's Endowment Fund, the fund continues to grow, and each year's distribution from the fund has been larger than the prior year. Fund I is marked for Benevolence, and Fund II may be used for needs of the church and/or Benevolence.

This year the distribution from Endowment I added about 9.5% to the amount Benevolence received from the General Budget. The list of agencies that benefit from our benevolence giving is extensive. Funds are given to the ELCA and the NC Synod as well as Emmaus Mission Development (a Christian ministry to assist the poor) and the Lifeline Fund (reducing seminary debt for NC clergy). We support Christian summer camps (NovusWay and Agape-Kure Beach), Lutheran Services of the Carolinas, and Lutheran World Relief, specifically Ukraine at this time. Other funds are given locally to McPIE. Crisis Assistance Ministries. Cooperative Christian Ministries in Cabarrus County, Charlotte Rescue Mission, Harvest Food Bank, and Loaves and Fishes. Money has been set aside for Christmas Family Sponsorships, Youth and Adult Scholarships for church programs, crisis help for church members and the McClintock community, and additional requests are being considered for Habitat for Humanity, Faith Ministries (new mission trip) and CROP Walk.

Distributions from Endowment II began in 2019. Those funds have been given to Thrive, Stone Soup Ministry, and the Pastors Discretionary Fund, which is used to help those in immediate need and for scholarships in the future.



Situation Report: Crisis in Ukraine condensed from an article by LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

Lutheran World Relief has committed \$7 million to respond to this crisis, and we expect to increase this amount as we secure additional funding. Our Humanitarian Action team is working with partners to implement programming based on short and long-term needs in

Poland and in Ukraine. We have deployed additional technical staff to support our relief operations, including a program manager, a health advisor, and an advisor to lead our efforts to prevent sexual exploitation and abuse in Ukraine and for Ukrainian refugees.

We are grateful for the thousands of Lutherans across the United States whose care and generosity have made it possible for us to respond immediately. At this time, financial gifts are the number one need to assist refugees on the move.
