Pastor's Perspective council goals: 2022

Each year is a significant one for our council to wrestle with important decisions that affect all 3000 members of Christ Lutheran. This year, with the hopeful easing of Covid restrictions, will be no exception. In anticipation of this coming year, Council identified four big rocks to keep their eye on as our focus:

1. Groundbreaking for Christ South - We don't know when, but it is our goal to break ground sometime this year. We cranked up the design team once again, looked into permitting, and revisited the capital campaign to be ready when Council convenes a congregational meeting later on to vote on moving forward. Stay tuned!

2. Celebrate the unity of Christ Lutheran - By design, each of our campuses has a unique expression, programming, worship and branding. However, we never want to lose sight of our unity. Therefore, we will intentionally schedule all-campus celebrations throughout the year to gather everyone together as one church.

3. Christ Concord vitality - As promised, when we adopted this struggling church in Concord four years ago, we have a task force that is studying the vitality, programming, outreach and impact of this campus. This team will report to Council and, in turn, Council will communicate to the rest of the congregation following this study.

4. Proactive re-entry strategy - Surely, Covid will end one day, right? Surely, we will be able to remove the masks and gather freely once again, right? We don't know when but we want to be prepared with a strategy to re-engage people, invite new ones and revitalize the youth programs, Wednesdays Together, McPIE and all the ministries that have suffered for two years. We don't want to be passive or reactive. This is a time to have a proactive re-entry strategy of moving beyond the restrictions of Covid.

I'm sure there will be many more unforeseen things that emerge throughout the year, but these will be our four big rocks for 2022. We want to put them out there for everyone to see and to keep us all accountable to the greater vision.

I want to thank Council for their boldness and commitment to envision a Christ Lutheran that is not a replica of the past, but a new church to meet new people for a new time.

SUNDAY LENTEN SERMON SERIES: SUBVERSIVE HOPE (March 6 - April 10)

Taken from Tim Keller's book, Hope in Times of Fear, our Sundays throughout Lent will show the upsidedown nature of the Gospel, in which God uses the foolish things to shame the wise, the weak things to shame the strong, the lowly things to shame the proud. And in doing so, ushers into the world through our believing hearts a hope that cannot fail.

March 6 • The Upside-Down Kingdom

The Gospel always takes us by surprise, always keeps us off balanced. It comes as that two-edged sword, comforting the afflicted and afflicting the comfortable. Those things that the world loves—strength, power, pride and success—are the very thing that this God overthrows with his upside-down kingdom. *1 Corinthians 27-31; Luke 14:7-11*

March 13 • The Boys Nobody Chose

It is a horrible feeling when picking sides for the game when you are the last one chosen. But in God's Subversive Hope, all that changes with the last becoming first and the first becoming last. From Gideon to Jephthah, Jacob to Moses, throughout the Bible, God chooses the least likely to transform his world. *1 Samuel 16:1-13; Luke 2:1-14*

March 20 • The Women Nobody Wanted

What skeletons do you have in your family's closet? The lineage of Jesus contains several that those concerned about a perfect bloodline would just as soon omit. Prostitutes, foreigners, unwed mothers and adulterers—the women nobody wanted were just the ones that God raised up for a greater purpose. The New Mask Protocol BEGINNING SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 27, 2022 by pastor scott

Throughout this pandemic, one of Christ Lutheran Council's goals was to provide consistency in regards to protocols between schools, businesses, the government and Christ Lutheran. Towards that end, we have done so in order to be good citizens, obeying and reenforcing county mandates.

Beginning February 26, however, both the City of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County have lowered their mask mandates for indoor gatherings. Effective Saturday, February 26, masks will be optional in all City of Charlotte government buildings for staff and members of the public. (CMS voted on February 22 to eliminate the mask mandate beginning March 7).

While people can still certainly continue to wear masks and individual organizations can enforce stricter rules, masks are now optional in our county. On Monday, February 21, the Council of Christ Lutheran met to review these new mandates and discussed what that means for our church at all three campuses.

Specifically, we have decided to:

- 1. Make masks optional for all events, indoors and outdoors, passing no judgment on those who choose to wear them.
- 2. Continue to provide safe distance at worship.
- 3. Encourage people to stay home if they test positive and/or aren't feeling well.
- 4. Mandate that staff and volunteers working with children 5 and under are vaccinated and continue to wear masks.

In addition, we will begin serving congregational meals once again on Wednesdays following the noon Lenten worship services, beginning on Ash Wednesday, March 2.

Now what?

No one believes that this means we will immediately go back to pre-Covid activities and numbers. We are living in "new normal" times. We have created strong habits over these past two years that will take time to amend. It is our hope that with the easing of these mandates, we can resume having meals together, open up ministries, offer more classes and organize congregational events. But it will take time to ramp up as people will need to feel confident enough once again to gather.

Thank you for your patience during these past two years. They have been trying on everyone. There is a real "Covid-Crankiness" out there that needs the Church to provide examples of patience, grace, forgiveness, and peace.

It's time. It's time to gather back together. It's time to see faces. It's time to share the peace. It's time to be the Church together once again and be that example of humanity and kindness for all the world to see.



REFUGEE & IMMIGRANT SERVICES with Badriji Jazic, LSC

On Sunday, March 13th we welcome Badrija Jazic, Director of Refugee and Immigrant Services at Lutheran Services of the Carolinas (LSC). As a former refugee from Bosnia, Jazic has dedicated most of her adult life helping others at LSC, where she has been Director since 2007.

Bedrija holds a BA degree in English and Literature from the University of Sarajevo, Bosnia and Herzegovina. After moving to South Carolina in 1996, she was hired by Lutheran Family Services in the Carolinas as an administrative assistant, then Area Manager for South Carolina Refugee Resettlement before assuming her current position of 13 years as LSC Director of Refugee and Immigrant Services.

Driven by her own experience and passion for serving most vulnerable immigrant communities, Bedrija worked tirelessly to expand programs which provide comprehensive, culturally, and linguistically appropriate services so all refugees, immigrants, unaccompanied minors and survivors of human trafficking can build a better life for themselves, their families and their new communities across South and North Carolina. <u>Register in REALM</u>.



UPCOMING STUDIES FOR Faith Fellowship Sunday Class



March 6 - April 17 **The Walk – Five Essential Practices of the Christian Life** (author Adam Hamilton)

Pastor and author Adam Hamilton focuses this 6-session DVD study on 5 essential spiritual practices that are rooted in Jesus' own walk with God and are taught throughout the New Testament. In the Gospels, Jesus modeled for us the Christian spiritual life. For over 2,000 years,

the Church has pursued these practices to support our own daily walk with Christ and to contribute growing together as a church: worshipping, studying, serving, giving and sharing.

Hamilton is senior pastor of The United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kansas, one of the fastest growing, influential mainline churches in America, averaging 8,000 weekly worshippers. He has authored 13 books and several small group studies on diverse topics such as forgiveness, simple living, love & marriage, morality, politics, God's will and world religions. He has a passion for helping Christians grow in their faith and to see the implications of the Christian Gospel for daily life. He studied at Oral Roberts University before attending and graduating from Perkins School of Theology.

ETERNITY IS NOW IN SESSION

April 24 - May 22 *Eternity Is Now In Session* (author John Ortberg)

Pastor Ortberg opens a dialogue about the true meaning of "eternity" by stating that most people believe it is something that begins after we die. In this 5-week DVD study, filmed on-site in Israel, Ortberg presents Jesus' definition of eternity – which He stated only once and with great precision. The author then leads participants to the radical rediscovery

of what the Bible really says about salvation and how believers can experience the unspeakably rich, interactive fellowship and joy that exists between Father, Son and Holy Spirit that is eternal life here and now, every minute of every day.

John Ortberg is an evangelical Christian author, a speaker and former senior pastor of Menlo Church in Northern California, a Presbyterian Church with over 4,000 members. He has published many successful books and small group studies. He received a degree from Wheaton College and his Master of Divinity and Ph.D. in clinical psychology from Fuller Seminary. A central theme of his teaching and books is personal spiritual formation, the transforming of character through authentic experiences with God.

PASTOR'S BLOG: Reconnected

I don't know about you, but lately my life has been a rollercoaster. Last year, we had a great middle school mini retreat where 40 youth got together safely and worked in small groups to have a Bible Study, played games, and did a service project. Then, we took kids to camp. Lutheridge was a wonderful experience! We started the school year with an outdoor luau for the middle and high school youth! It was great. Things seemed to be getting "back to normal." Then Omicron hit.

We were back isolating. I had multiple families tell me they would see me in February, and now March. I'm tired. I think we're all tired. I want my faith family back. I want to keep everyone safe, but I miss you. Our children and youth need each other. The adults need each other. We're better together than we'll ever be apart.

Jesus recognized that we needed each other, too. In the Gospel of John, he was praying to God the father and said this, "I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one — I in them and you in me — so that they may be brought to complete unity. Then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me."

I have been thinking about how we can start gathering again, feeling like we're one again. What can reunite us when people have lost connections with their faith family? Children and youth's friend groups have shrunk. Children don't want to go to things where they won't know anyone. Youth don't want to take the step out of their comfort zone. We need to reconnect again.

I'm planning on some low-commitment, easy family events to get people connected again. The first is in connection with our Middle and High school Fusion Nights. Fusion events are youth group time once a month where youth share a meal, devotion and some kind of activity. While Fusion is happening in the Pit, parents with or without younger children can have Family Infusion. This is a gathering of adults (and young children, if they have them...but you don't have to) that also share in a meal and gather for devotion and to connect (or reconnect!). We'll meet at the same time as Fusion to make it an easy night for the whole family. Everyone has something to do.

Then once a month we'll have an intergenerational family event. This can be a movie night on Christ South's land or strawberry picking – something fun for the whole family. Children and youth can make friends while the adults are too!

Our first Family Infusion event is Sunday, February 27 from 6-7:30 p.m. in Fellowship Hall (Providence campus). Here we'll plan out our first few event days. Come join us to connect, reconnect or just meet some amazing people! <u>Register in REALM.</u>

McPIE Grocery Distribution

While it may seem the end of the pandemic is nearing, families are still reeling from the effects of unemployment and financial strain. One of the best ways McPIE has continued to support our families is through weekly grocery distribution. We partner closely with McClintock counselors to support some of the most at-risk families each week. What began as 20 bags per week in March 2020, ballooned to 140 bags in 2021 – and is now a targeted 42 bags per week.

To date, McPIE has distributed 574 bags of groceries since the beginning of the school year! Families are supplied with a nutritious recipe, ingredients to create that dish, and weekly staples such as cereal, granola bars, fruit, canned meat, beans/rice, and bread. A small, dedicated group of volunteers keeps this going by packing bags and sitting at the school to distribute bags as families drive through. Thank you to all who have donated monetary funds or food to keep this mission going. Families are truly appreciative of this support every week!

Supplies for Bucks Bus

The Bucks Bus at McClintock Middle School is a way to incentivize students and reward them for good behavior, daily attendance, and being a kind friend. Students earn "bucks" that they can shop with on Fridays. McPIE helps with this by providing snacks and candy. WHAT'S NEW WITH PASTOR DREW

Serving Christ & Country

In a sense, Pastor Drew Goodson has always wanted to be a military chaplain. He first named it as a seminarian over 15 years ago when a Navy recruiter visited his campus in Philadelphia. "That stoked an interest that I think I actually had a lot sooner," Drew says. "But then I tucked it away for as long as I could."

After 12 years of parish ministry in the NC Synod, most recently as associate pastor of Christ Lutheran, Charlotte, Drew is not keeping his call to military chaplaincy tucked away any longer.

In December, Drew was commissioned as a US Navy chaplain and he is currently in Newport, Rhode Island for five weeks of Officer Development School followed by seven weeks of Chaplaincy School. Once completed, Drew will move with his wife, Megan, and sons, Zach and Caleb, to their first duty station in Norfolk, VA where he will serve as chaplain on the USS Philippine Sea cruiser. Growing up, Drew had close relationships with his grandfathers who were veterans. "They were both men of faith and character that I really looked up to," says Drew. "So much so I developed an interest in military life and history from a young age. I even thought about going to one of the service academies after high school." Drew instead attended the University

of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for college, and through participating in Lutheran Campus Ministry he discerned a call to public ministry. But the pull towards military service never went away.

> "When the Navy recruiter came to seminary, it was like this alignment of my interest in building Christian community and serving Christ, as well as serving our country," he says.

The call does not come without sacrifice. Drew remembers all those years ago when he first told Megan about his visit with the Navy recruiter, and she burst into tears thinking about what it could mean

for their future. Now in leaving Charlotte, their family is not only saying goodbye to their congregation but to extended family who live close by. Drew says, "I think a lot about the Gospel passage when

Peter says to Jesus, 'We've left home and fields and sisters and brothers to follow you.' That's really literal for us right now."

As Drew and his family step out in faith, he recognizes the ways his experiences in parish ministry prepared him for this new adventure. As one of the pastors of Christ, Charlotte, Drew learned team ministry, an experience he sees as important for military service and chaplaincy in an interfaith setting. In his first call to serve Our Redeemer, Greenville, he also led campus ministry with East Carolina University and loved it. With 75% of sailors between ages 17-24, Drew sees similar opportunities for ministry in the Navy. "They're young people and they're trying to figure out basic things in life, and hopefully I can share God's love in the midst of that," he says.

Drew is excited by the idea of being embedded among the people he serves on a day-to-day basis. When his cruiser is deployed for tours of 4-8 months in foreign waters, he'll go, too. In this model of ministry, he sees an opportunity to share Christ through a Lutheran lens. "The ELCA's whole model of missionary work is accompaniment—saying to people, 'We're here to walk alongside you, to build a relationship with you, and to help you see how God is already at work in your life," Drew says.

Drew sees this approach to chaplaincy as particularly vital among the military, where the burdens service members carry can be heavy. "When violence is unavoidable, it's tragic and it's something we need to repent of, from a spiritual perspective, to receive that gift of forgiveness," says Drew. "I think for a lot of soldiers and sailors who have had to be involved in violence, to hear that word of confession and absolution is life-changing. There are a lot of people in the military who struggle with feeling hopeless and alone, or with thoughts of suicide. Ultimately, I think God has put me here to help save lives and to shine the light of Christ."

Drew will remain a pastor rostered in the NC Synod while serving as a chaplain in the US Navy. He will join two other NC Synod pastors who serve as chaplains in the US Military—Chaplain Brian Stamm and Chaplain John Connelly. Additionally, three NC Synod pastors serve as chaplains in the reserves—Chris Webb, Jasmine Tesdahl, and Linn Fisher.
