Important Updates

Christ Concord

With the vote on April 14 to cease worship at Christ Concord and to put the land up for sale, we find ourselves looking towards the horizon for a new vision from God to emerge. Our greatest concern is to care for the people of Christ Concord, and to make sure that their spiritual needs are met. Towards that end, each member has a choice. We have reached out to nearby Calvary Lutheran Church in Concord and encourage those members to attend that community of believers and help them grow their contemporary worship. However, some may choose to remain a part of Christ Online or even travel to Christ Providence. We would welcome that. We trust that the Holy Spirit will guide them to a place of belonging and growth.

Habitat for Humanity in Concord has provided us with a non-binding Letter of Intent to do their due diligence and return to us with an offer to purchase the land with the aim of building an entire community of affordable housing. We are thrilled with this possibility. And what's more, they would like to repurpose the sanctuary for this neighborhood as a community center or perhaps a childcare center. I hope that we can be a part of this transformation so that ministry continues on this sacred site.

When we get an offer, we will have another congregational meeting to review the offer and vote on the sale and how to distribute the funds. Stay tuned!

Pentecost Celebration by PASTOR RYAN

Remember your first Pentecost? All the... Food? Is there Pentecost Food? There's no decorations (like wreaths and trees for Christmas). There aren't any hymns and carols. Not really. There are songs for the Holy Spirit but I don't think there are songs specifically for Pentecost. There aren't traditions, not really. Even Palm Sunday gets us waving branches around, but Pentecost gets nothing.

It's odd that we should have absolutely no traditions for Pentecost. It is the second most important holy day in the Christian faith. Obviously Easter is paramount, but the celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit doesn't even get second fiddle – that's probably Christ in our culture!

Jesus said that it was to our advantage that He leave (John 16:7). We understand that it is to our advantage that He die. His death for our sin is the cornerstone of our faith. It would seem, then, that He should stay. His leaving would be bad, right? Who could be better or more advantageous for us then Jesus Christ Himself?! The Holy Spirit, that's who.

The Holy Spirit is how Christ is with us always (Matt 28:20, John 16:13-15). The Holy Spirit is God, our very present help. He is the Way. He is the way we are all knit together. He is what we receive at our baptism. He is the Church. He is so much that I am going to start veering into poetry in an attempt to capture all He is and does.

He is imminently important to our spiritual journey and the well being of our Soul. For this reason Paul makes every effort to get back to Jerusalem for Pentecost (Acts 20:16, and again I Cor 16:8). Paul tries to get to Jerusalem NOT for Easter, as we might expect; nor for any Jewish festival, but for Pentecost! The coming of the Holy Spirit (as promised). The Birth of the Church. God's presence. Yet no traditions, or songs, or decorations.

We are going to change that. We are starting a tradition, a celebration, for the coming of our Lord. Not His coming as a baby – that's Christmas, but His coming as the Holy Spirit.

On May 19th we are having a celebration. The Pentecost Celebration will start at 11 a.m. and go until 1 p.m. We hope that you will worship and stick around, no matter which worship you attend. Chef Mike is preparing a BBQ (or hotdog) lunch. We will have a band and there will be activities for the younger among us. Enjoy food and fellowship. Help start a new tradition for such an important moment on the Christian calendar.

If you plan on eating, we ask that you please register and pay in REALM by Sunday, May 12th. Adult meals are \$15 a piece and kids meals for ages 10 and under are \$7 a piece. Scan or click the QR Code below to register.





Benevolence & Outreach Update by AMY DANIELS

As part of the Big Rocks of 2023, our task group was responsible for exploring ways to help with the lack of affordable housing in Charlotte. Although we met several times during the year, at this point we have no clear recommendation for the Church Council.

We thought it necessary to summarize the things that our Benevolence and Outreach efforts already do to help alleviate the stress of the affordable housing shortage, and also to share some investigations we made along the way.

Christ Lutheran Church:

- 1) Gives grants to A Roof Above and Crisis Assistance Ministries for a total of \$70,000 in 2023;
- 2) Serves and provides a meal for the Soup Kitchen every month;
- 3) Hosts Room In The Inn (RITI) guests over four winter months;
- 4) Collects and delivers clothing to Crisis Assistance Free Store every week;
- 5) Collects food for Loaves and Fishes twice a year;
- 6) Supports an Afghan Refugee Family with plans and promise to help with humanitarian parole for more of their extended family members;
- 7) Supplies produce and groceries for families in our community every week through our "Feed a Family" fund;
- 8) Offers "Getting Ahead" at McPIE Family Nights for parents to assess life and set goals;
- 9) Supports 40+ families with Thanksgiving meals;
- 10) Supports 50+ families with help at Christmas;
- 11) At least two families have bought homes to rent to families we know at an affordable rate:
- 12) Our community crisis budget from Benevolence helps "bridge the gap" for singular crisis events to help families avoid eviction;
- 13) Offers free, high quality summer opportunities (Freedom School, Science camps) and scholarships to other camps.

As you can see, our congregation makes a tremendous impact on the affordable housing crisis in these and other direct and indirect ways.

Our task group of 10+ people also met with several community agencies and groups throughout 2023, including DreamKey Partners, Freedom Community, Homeless Services Network and Project Outpour, Lutheran Services Carolinas (LSC) and Give Impact. We were impressed by the variety of services and depth of conviction.

While some of us were very focused on ways to help our immediate neighbors in the McClintock community, we explored all sorts of services and sectors. We want to encourage individuals and our congregation to continue to search and help in individual and collective ways as we move forward. Affordable housing is a huge issue that is very complex and will take many solutions from many angles to continue to make a difference. God is calling us to serve and care for our neighbors... Most importantly, God calls each and every one of us to BE a good neighbor!

Feed A Family Thanks

Thank you to all the generous souls who have contributed to the Feed a Family fund! We provide groceries to families without a car and groceries and gas cards to those living in hotels. We also, with the help of amazing volunteers, provide groceries for teachers and others with cars who come to McClintock. We are currently helping 38 families with a bag of groceries each week. Groceries are so expensive right now, so we shop around to save money. We work closely with the school social worker to identify families who need help.

In an article from the Charlotte Observer from March 22, writer Ames Alexander discusses Mecklenburg County's issue with lagging food stamp approvals. He sites that applications for food stamps in Mecklenburg County rose 70% from 2021 to 2023. Nourish Up's grocery program demand (formerly Loaves and Fishes) has increased year to year by over 30%. Simply said, demand is surging because "wages have not kept pace with the rising cost of housing, food and other essentials".



What is Affordable Housing? by MICHELE WENZ

As a resident of Charlotte or the surrounding areas, you probably hear or read the term "affordable housing" at least weekly, if not daily. The city of Charlotte, Mecklenburg County, local businesses, a variety of nonprofits and local places of worship are all stake holders in the attempt to provide more affordable housing. You, like Christ Lutheran Church (CLC), have likely supported their efforts in a variety of ways.

But have you ever thought about becoming more personally involved in working to solve the affordable housing issue? Have you ever wondered why and how the lack of affordable housing became such a huge problem?

While gathering information for this article, I was fortunate to be introduced to several individuals with ties to CLC who have found themselves becoming landlords or have had difficulty searching for affordable housing either for themselves or others. Regardless of which experience, these individuals each had some very similar comments and experiences regarding affordable housing and its challenges in our area.

What follows is a synopsis of the information gathered during my conversations with these individuals as well as others who work at organizations whose primary focus is to address and work towards solving the local affordable housing challenge. Also, for the purposes of this article, I am looking only at the challenges of renting affordable housing.

Let's start with what is considered affordable housing. Housing is considered affordable if no more than 30% of a household's income is needed to live there. In Charlotte, the cost of renting or purchasing a home has skyrocketed so quickly in the last few years that many people in our community struggle to find affordable housing.

Most individuals who are looking to rent affordable housing are either paying the total rent directly to a landlord, using a voucher that was issued though Inlivian (formerly Charlotte Housing Authority) or a combination of these two scenarios. Whether an individual is paying rent or using a voucher, there are several consistent challenges encountered at the very start of their search for an affordable housing option, including lack of units, non-refundable application fees, and large move-in deposits (usually 1-2 or more months' rent). The negative effects of paying the non-refundable application fee for each potential housing unit and the large move-in deposits are clear. The amount of money available for rent as well as other basic items - food, clothing, monthly bills, healthcare, and transportation needs - is reduced.

A conversation with an individual who pays rent walked me through the process of finding new housing after she was forced to leave housing due to serious flooding and a lack of willingness by the landlord to repair and solve the resulting problems and issues. She had been able to pay monthly rent, the required utilities and provide for her children, but now faced a steep increase in expenses, i.e. paying weekly for two hotel rooms because her family was too large to stay in one room, paying to eat out because they could no longer cook meals, the non-refundable rental application fees at each potential home, and the large move-in deposits that the landlords required. These expenses, along with other basic needs' expenses, provided too great a challenge to handle on her own.

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However, she was fortunate that she had developed positive and strong relationships with a variety of individuals with ties to CLC and felt comfortable enough to ask for guidance and assistance. Through this network, she was able to find and secure an affordable home where she and her family could safely live. Of course, challenges remain but having stable and affordable housing secured has removed a huge challenge and allows her to continue making forward strides.

As previously mentioned, another payment source for rent is a voucher from Inlivian, also known as Section 8. Vouchers vary in amount, i.e., a single renter will receive a smaller amount than a renter with dependents. They are given directly to the landlord each month and only cover rent. If the rent is more than the voucher provides the renter is responsible for the difference. In addition, vouchers are only valid for a specific amount of time and the clock starts ticking as soon as the voucher is awarded. If the renter is unable to find housing within the voucher's time frame, it expires, and the individual must start the process over. Currently the wait list to be awarded a voucher is around 10 years.

Unfortunately, a stigma has been attached to individuals or families that are using housing vouchers. This stigma most likely is one of the leading causes of dissuading some potential landlords to accept vouchers as payment. This is another issue that compounds the challenges that these renters already face.

Another conversation I had was with individuals who did not set out to become landlords but ended up becoming landlords anyway. Their story starts with a relationship between their tenant, her son, and themselves. It took several years to develop a strong relationship, but when their tenant experienced a difficult time in finding a new rental that would accept her voucher, she was comfortable enough to ask for their assistance and guidance. The search was difficult and frustrating but one day things started to fall into place. When it was all over, a home had been purchased by the now landlords, and their tenant and her son had a safe and affordable place to call home.

There was no mention of any issues with accepting the voucher as payment. In fact, they pointed out that during the pandemic while many landlords were having issues getting paid, they did not. The voucher arrived each month without fail. While they are open to renting to additional individuals, their challenge is finding housing in a safe and secure area that can be purchased at an affordable price so that financially the math works. The skyrocketing price of real estate has exacerbated the lack of affordable housing units.

Solving the affordable housing challenge in our area is complicated and has many layers. I thank you for taking the time to read this article and my hope is that it's done a few things. First, I hope this article has provided more information to individuals who may not be familiar with or understand about the affordable housing challenges in Charlotte and surrounding areas. Second, that it makes the issue a little more personal by showing that there are individuals with ties to CLC that are involved in some direct way with affordable housing. Third, that the article has peaked additional interest of others within the CLC community in becoming more involved with the challenges of affordable housing.
