from the Senior Pastor

With Governor Cooper's August 5th announcement that Phase 2 will continue until atleast September 10th, we have made some decisions regarding our fall programming. As we look at Kick-Off Sunday on September 13, we will continue our summer worship schedule of only offering two worship services online at our Providence campus (no Bridge Service). However, the times will change slightly to 9 a.m. for Traditional and 11 a.m. for Contemporary. This will enable Sunday School to meet between services.

SUNDAY SCHOOL STARTS SEPTEMBER 13

Adult Sunday School will offer both online and a limited number of in-person classes. In addition, some of the virtual classes may meet at times other than Sunday morning. Find more about each class on page 5 of this newsletter. Pre-registration is also available via Realm or through the Christ Online Virtual Schedule (*christelca.org/online*).

Senior High Sunday School will meet virtually for fellowship, socializing and bible study. In addition, Caroline Targonski, our Youth Director, is trying to schedule smaller in-person group gatherings as able.

Middle School Confirmation/Sunday School will have several learning opportunities with small groups meeting virtually. They will also explore ways for smaller, face to face gatherings outside of Sunday morning for fellowship and socializing.

Elementary Sunday School will start Christ Kids TV, which will replace the children's sermon and in-person classes with pre-recorded videos filled with songs, arts & crafts, and a weekly message from one of our pastors. It will take on the form similar to our Virtual VBS this past summer. Our family ministry team is working with parents to create responsible socialization opportunities.

Nursery will not meet as long as we continue to remain in Phase Two.

WEDNESDAYS TOGETHER STARTS SEPTEMBER 16

Food As long as we remain in Phase Two, we will not be offering a communal meal. However, we are looking for ways to expand our "Heat and Eat" meal ministry that started under Covid 19.

Transportation As long as we remain in Phase Two, transportation will be severely curtailed and offered in a limited capacity.

Adult Education Pastors Scott and Drew will offer a hybrid class from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. that will include both in-person students socially spaced apart as well as those who can participate online. In addition, we will also offer two other virtual classes. Read more about these classes on page 5.

High School The Experience will continue to meet, but primarily online with limited face to face contact. They will gather to socialize, care for one another and work on music for their Christmas program.

Middle School Like the high school youth, middle school will explore a hybrid mode of youth ministry that will include both virtual connections as well as limited face to face gatherings.

Elementary School We are exploring ways to do limited musical programming that does not include singing (a high risk activity).

Nursery Will not meet as long as we are in Phase Two.

Nobody wants to meet and hug and shake hands together in person more than I do. However, to be good citizens and for the sake of the more vulnerable among us, we want to heed the directives of our government leaders and do our part.

How long? You know as well as I do that long range planning these days is about three weeks out. I can tell you how the fall will begin, but I can't tell you for how long. We will wait for the governor to move us into Phase Three, listen to the counsel of our physicians and determine how to move forward safely. We long to be together again, but only when we can do so more safely. Until then, we are thankful for the technology that brings us together even as we are forced to remain distant.

Who are we?

The simple answer seems *Christ Lutheran*. But as we expand with four very different campuses reaching different people with unique worship experiences, that question is not as simple as we once thought.

This was the question we tried to answer as we relooked at our logo. Does a large window capture who we are at Christ Concord? After many iterations of a new logo without much agreement, our logo team immediately embraced this new logo. With its colors, it captures the vibrancy of a church that is alive. The colors of the different campuses merge together to form one unified logo.

The four individual campuses are united with a similar logo and the boldfaced word CHRIST. Yet they are given their own unique and autonomous look with a different color and sized font.

What's Happening at Christ South?

As summer comes to an end, it's amazing how different this fall will be. Even college football hangs in the balance as we try to figure out how to adapt to distance learning and help our families settle into this "temporary normal."

For the near future, we are working on Christ South's new home. We have officially launched the first phase of our Master Plan which will include a building for worship. This first phase will be submitted to the town of Weddington for approval at the end of August. I'll save you the complicated legal and zoning details, but the long and short of it is that this will be a 3-month process. Once we've gotten the approvals we need, we'll be submitting the plan in its entirety to the congregation so that we can all pray for this vision.

In the meantime, we struggle with what our community will look like. We will continue to stay online, but are already discussing the details of what "church" will look like until we have our permanent home. Once recommended guidelines tell us it is safe, we are looking at in-person gatherings outside at the Old Dairy Farm that will allow us to socially distance while reconnecting. This is a tricky process and one that we've not had to navigate before, but we want you to know that we are planning and praying and ask you to also pray for our future.

September 13th is our Kickoff Sunday where we traditionally mark the beginning of fall and all of our programs and events. This will obviously look a little different this year. While we do not find it feasible to meet in-person on this date, we do have a special Family

Drive Thru Event planned from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Farm. Families can drive through the farm, get a special blessing for their students and family and get an official Christ South swag bag full of goodies for the family.

Through all of this planning and considering, one thing has become abundantly clear: that church takes place outside the walls of a building. Church is happening in your living rooms on Sunday when you tune in and share communion together. Church is happening when you check in with the people you're used to seeing on Sundays to make sure they are ok. As we try to figure this out, the where and the how has changed, but the who and the what has always been the same. YOU are the church now and you will be the church when we are in the same room together again.



Endowment Fund Updateby JOE WALL

Christ Lutheran has been and continues to be blessed in many ways. One of those blessings is the continued generosity of our church community. It was announced earlier in the year that an anonymous member of the congregation challenged others to contribute \$25,000 to CLC's Endowment Outreach Fund to further support our mission "beyond the walls" of the church. This generous anonymous member agreed to also contribute \$25,000 to the Endowment if these contributions were received or pledged before August 31st.

As of the beginning of August, Christ Lutheran has received 55 pledges and contributions totaling \$28,120 to fund the Endowment. That is outstanding news! Even better news is that the vast majority of the pledges and donations came from first-time givers to the Endowment Fund. Additional designated gifts to the Endowment Outreach Fund will be accepted.

The Endowment Committee thanks you for your generosity, faithfulness and commitment. To show appreciation for Endowment donors and to celebrate meeting the \$25,000 challenge, the committee has scheduled its bi-annual Endowment Dinner for Sunday, October 4th. Though we cannot gather together in person for this celebration, the committee is providing a Heat and Eat meal on that date so that we may share the celebration in spirit.

What is the Endowment Fund?

The Endowment Fund of Christ Lutheran is separate from the annual operating plan and budget. The purpose of the Endowment is to provide an element of stability to the church's finances and missions into perpetuity. The Endowment is actually comprised of two distinct funds which serve different purposes. Fund One within the Endowment is for Outreach and is directed by the Benevolence Committee for purposes beyond the walls and campuses of Christ Lutheran. The second component of the Endowment is a General Purpose fund to pay for special projects or extraordinary church expenses; these funds are directed for use by the Church Council. Last year, the Endowment supplemented over \$33,000 to church priorities; of that amount, \$25,000 was designated from Fund One for Outreach.

Irving returned to Europe in 1944 as a soldier in the US Army.

Pastor Dallman Remembered

Pastor Dick Dallman died on August 8, 2020 from complications caused by the COVID virus. He was born and raised in St. Louis, Missouri and graduated Wittenberg University in 1956 and Hamma School of Theology in 1960. It was during his pastoral internship at St. Jacob's Lutheran Church in Miamisburg, Ohio that he met his wife Arlene who he

affectionately called "Dearie". They were married 61 years.

Dick Dallman was a beloved pastor with abundant grace, a vigorous faith and caring, practical wisdom. He was an outstanding preacher. He could make complex theology and murky spiritual dilemmas easily and calmly understood. His three-point sermons were accessible and relevant; filled with humor and everyday applications.

His ministry began at Emanuel Lutheran Church in Lawrenceburg, Indiana and continued at St. Matthews Lutheran Church in Fort Wayne, where he built a new sanctuary. In 1968, Pastor Dallman was called to Resurrection Lutheran Church in Franklin Park, Illinois where he and Arlene spent five years and made lasting friendships. The heart of his ministry was at Trinity Lutheran Church in Moline, Illinois where he served for 15 years, building a robust community, renovating the church complex and ministering to those in his care. Pastor Dallman also served at Zion Lutheran Church in Anoka, Minnesota.

After retiring, he served as interim pastor in Las Vegas, Tucson, and then at two churches here in Charlotte: Christ Lutheran and St. Luke's Lutheran. It was while serving as an interim pastor at Christ Lutheran that he and Arlene found their community of friends with whom they happily spent the last 22 years.

Pastor Dallman was a leader in the wider Lutheran Church and local communities. He listed as his personal accomplishments or joys: serving on the Synod Councils in both IN/KY and IL, serving on the board of Lutheran Social Services, Ft. Wayne, IN, serving as the Chairman of the Board of Lutheran Hospital and as Chairman of the Lutheran Hospital Foundation Board in Moline. He also served on the board of Forsberg Homes, Augustana College and was the keynote speaker at the Illinois Synod meeting, Chairman of the Transition Team to form the new Illinois Synod in 1987-88, and a member of the Board of Directors of Lutheran General Hospital in Chicago.


He embraced life and lived it fully. He was a devoted husband and father, and reveled in time spent with his children and grandchildren. He was boisterously proud of his German heritage and, despite having left St. Louis in 1952, remained an ardent St. Louis Cardinals fan. He enjoyed traveling, planning travel, cooking, gardening, and bringing friends together to share a drink and a meal.


In his notes for his funeral, he wrote, "That's it. Have fun, shed a tear or two, but know how much I loved all of you and how great my life has been. God's grace abounds!"

How Has Project Bihar Helped During Covid19?

You may have been wondering how the Covid19 impact has impacted the Bihar community. Please see the update below from Lutheran World Relief about the ways Project Bihar is having a positive effect right now in ways that none of us could have imagined when we reached our goal last fall at the Speedway. Thank you for keeping these villages of Bihar in your prayers.

Greetings from Baltimore! My name is Logan Noonan, LWR's program manager for the Asia region, and it has been my great pleasure to support the Partnership Bihar project for the last year or so. Dave and Lisa asked me to provide some more details on how COVID is affecting the communities that are part of Partnership Bihar. As we all know, many lives and livelihoods around the world have been impacted by COVID-19 and the community who benefits from the Partnership Bihar is no different. Despite difficulties related to COVID-19, Professional Assistance for Development Action (PRADAN), LWR's partner in Bihar, was able to continue the vital agriculture work of the project. Over 3,500 women farmers have been supported throughout the crisis.

The pandemic made it difficult for farmers to go to markets to buy inputs such as seeds and fertilizer for the pre-monsoon planting season. In response, the project used its mobile application to take seed and fertilizer orders and ensured that enough was available at the project's grading and sorting centers. These centers are much closer to the farmers than the markets they usually use, which helped save them time and limit travel while at the same time enabling them to get the much-needed supplies. For farmers who were not able

to reach the grading and sorting centers, the project's village trainers delivered the seeds and fertilizer to directly their house. Access to these supplies helped farmers to ensure they were able to complete planting on time, despite setbacks caused by the pandemic.

The project's village trainers – who provide agricultural extension, training and ongoing support to farmers – provided training and support for the planting season through home visits rather than gathering a group of farmers as they normally would. During these visits, the village trainers provided information on social distancing, mask wearing and hand washing.

Many men who live in the village go into the city to find temporary work in order to supplement their meager income, but because of travel restrictions imposed by the government of India they were unable to do so, leaving their families with less income. The government set up several safety nets for farming families including a cash supplement of 6,000 rupees and increased access to credit. Government support services can be difficult for poor farmers to navigate, but the project was able to provide support to ensure these farming families were able to take advantage of the support offered.

Recently, movement restrictions have been relaxed and some migrants have been able to return to work. There was also good and timely rain this year, which leaves farmers hopeful for good crops of rice, lentils, and vegetables. COVID's effect on the community have been difficult but, thanks in large part to support from the project, it has been manageable.

On May 22, 2020, the Board of Trustees and the Leadership Team announced the decision to suspend all scheduled summer camp programming for 2020 at each of our sites due to the health and safety risks of Covid-19. This was a heartbreaking decision; however, we continue to receive overwhelming appreciation from parents for keeping their children safe. While we know we made the right decision, the loss of summer camp alone is a \$1.8 million financial loss. Overall, we anticipate a \$3,000,000 revenue loss from program and hosted ministry cancellations and we are working hard to fill the gap.


Summer Camp Remix Re-cap

Summer at Christ Lutheran and McClintock Middle School looked very different this summer. With the COVID-19 pandemic closing school buildings and canceling transportation, our summer science camp and Freedom School went virtual!

A team of McClintock admin and staff pulled together 7 weeks of STEAM engagement for students to keep their brains active over the summer break. Whether it was building rollercoasters, bridges,



solar ovens, tessellations or kites, students had fun and learned a lot, too! Each week, students and families came to McClintock during grab 'n' go lunch pick-up where they could also pick-up their weekly Challenge Pack. Once at home, they engineered their creations, videoed themselves showcasing their build via an app called Flip Grid, and participated in weekly Zoom classes.



To further prevent summer learning loss, literacy was included. Freedom School is typically held on CLC's campus, where students dive into reading. - · 300 school supply bags assembled


School Supplies


