

Church Council & Big Rocks

Every year we go through a very specific, spiritual and intentional process to raise up leaders of Christ Lutheran to serve on Council. These twelve elected leaders do not run the church or become unpaid volunteers to run programs or supervise the day to day operations of the church. Their role is very specific:

- To implement and oversee policies of Christ Lutheran;
- To be keepers of the vision, maintain a clear direction for the church;
- To provide feedback, decisions and counsel to the senior pastor.

On Friday and Saturday, February 7 and 8, the Council, their spouses, pastors and other leaders of the church gathered for a retreat to get to know each other and begin dreaming of where the Spirit is leading Christ Lutheran.

This year, they put together several Big Rocks as goals for 2025:

- Develop the property, programs and vision for Southland;
- · Increase in-person worship by 10-15% in 2025;
- · Develop a long-range financial plan for property and debt;
- · Expansion of the Columbarium;
- Develop a clear path to discipleship including adult confirmation and small groups:
- · Growth in all ages for Family Ministry Team with an emphasis on whole family engagement:
- · Stronger outreach to young adults, post-college to age 40;
- · More congregational fellowship events;
- Expand service opportunities to include Habitat build, further outreach to McClintock Middle School, Western North Carolina and Lutheridge;
- Partnership with another church or two for a civil rights trail tour.

Lenten Sunday Series:MODERN DAY IDOLS

OVERVIEW: Idols are more than wooden or stone objects placed on an altar to worship. They are usually much more subtle than that. They often begin as good things in our lives that over time, become an obsession or a distraction or a fixation that replaces God as our ultimate desire.

March 9 · Money

Luke 12:13-21; 1 Timothy 6:6-12

Money is a necessity. Objectively, money itself is not the problem. Paul warns that it is the love of money. But for many people, money has become that idol that they will sacrifice anything to obtain and please. What is a healthy look at money that doesn't turn it into an idol?

March 16 • Sexuality

Genesis 2:18-25; 1 Cor. 6:12-20

God made us sexual beings as a gift. But when that turns into an objectification of another person for one's own pleasure, this gift becomes an idol that movies, songs and advertisements have exploited. What precautions can we establish to prevent this good gift from becoming a degrading idol?

March 23 • My Country Tis of Thee...

Romans 13:1-7; Acts 5:27-33; John 18:33-38a Love of country is a good thing. Throughout the Old Testament, God protected the nation of Israel from its enemies. But nationalism, taken to the extreme, can blind us to the ills of our country. As Paul wrote, "We must obey God rather than people."

March 30 · Work

Genesis 2:4-9 (3:17-19); Colossians 3:16-17| Work is one of the good gifts that God gave to Adam. While many look forward to that day in which they can be done working, the concept of retirement cannot be found in the Bible. But this gift of work can quickly become an idol by the work-a-holic that finds meaning,

purpose and identity only in their career.

April 6 • ME!

Luke 9:23-26; Psalm 139:1-4, 13-14

What? How can I become my own idol? I am created in the image of God. My life is a gift from God. I must create healthy boundaries in order to protect my own integrity and sanity. At what point, does this become self-worship?

Lenten Wednesday Noon Series: FIRST CORINTHIANS: MESSY CHURCH, FAITHFUL GOD

OVERVIEW: Church can be a messy business. It is not a modern or postmodern problem. Divisions, quarreling and immorality almost seem endemic within a community of people. In the first century, it was no different. In this letter to the Corinthians, Paul is addressing an increasingly wayward people to remind them of their unity, belovedness and identity in Christ. In our own life together, we sometimes need this reminder of our shared foundation. Paul reminds us how we, the church, of saints and sinners, live as God's holy people in this world.

March 5 (Ash Wednesday) • Forgetting Who and Whose We Are

1 Corinthians 1:1-17; John 10:27-28

Paul begins his letter reminding the Corinthians that they are called to be saints, set apart for the service of God. Blameless? Certainly not! Sometimes we forget who we are just as Paul reminds them what it means to be God's people. As we begin our Lenten journey, we can reflect on our calling as God's people and examine the places where we may need renewal.

A STRONG YEAR FOR CLC ENDOWMENT: **Growth 8 Impact**

2024 was a very positive year for the CLC Endowment, allowing us to provide additional financial support to both the Benevolence Committee and Christ Lutheran's expense reserves, which ultimately led to impactful distributions and significant fund growth.

Financial Contributions & Distributions Fund Allocation & Impact

As a brief reminder, Endowment Fund I focuses on making a difference "Beyond These Walls." This past year the Benevolence Committee directed distributions to several ministries, including:

- · Crisis Assistance
- · A Roof Above
- · McClintock Partners in Education
- · ELCA Synod

Endowment Fund II serves as a general-purpose reserve fund designed to strengthen financial preparedness for unplanned expenses managed by the Church Council. In 2024, funds were allocated to reserve for major repairs, such as aging infrastructure maintenance (e.g., roof, HVAC systems).

In 2024, the CLC Endowment distributed \$31,216 from Endowment Fund I (Benevolence Fund), and \$20,797 from Endowment Fund II (Expense Reserves).

Fund Growth & Contributions

Our Endowment Funds saw an 11.4% return on investment in 2024, which coupled with additional contributions, further strenathened both funds.

- · Contributions and returns to Endowment Fund I resulted in an ending balance of \$840,677.
- · Contributions and returns to Endowment Fund II resulted in an ending balance of \$707,485.

Looking Ahead to 2025

The Endowment Committee will focus on the ongoing management of the Endowment Funds to ensure financial stability and continued growth, but also the very important mission of providing education and resources on estate planning to help our church community secure their family's financial future.

Recent studies suggest that over 50% of Americans do not have a Will. Without a legally documented estate plan, families may face State-determined asset distribution that may not align with their wishes, or a lengthy and costly probate process that delays access to funds for heirs. 

Accusations of Money Laundering

On Monday, February 10, I spoke with the CEO of LSC, Ted Goins, asking him about these charges. Ted was very clear. These monies come from our State Department for the purpose of resettling refugees from around the world. Using this money, LSC resettled 1,821 refugees in both North and South Carolina. A remarkable ministry.

I asked him about these refugees. Who are they, where do they come from and how are they vetted? Again, Ted was very clear. These are refugees who have been vetted and approved by the State Department itself, and then given to LSC to resettle. These are not illegals who have snuck over the border but are in fact "legal" refugees named and identified by the State Department that LSC has been asked to settle by the State Department.

I have to think that most thinking Americans believe that there is waste in the huge 7.3 trillion dollar government budget for 2025. The goal to trim the waste and stop unnecessary spending is admirable. But as Ted and I talked about, we both agreed that a more strategic approach with a scalpel without defacing the good name of organizations like LSC would be to everyone's benefit. As it stands, all funding from the State Department for resettlement has been eliminated for LSC for at least three months, and probably upwards to a year. That is unfortunate as many refugees abiding by the rules will now suffer.

I know Ted Goins as a man of integrity and LSC as a far reaching organization that does amazing work from adoptions to refugees to nursing homes to traumatic brain injuries. They undergo two or three independent audits each year. I would not want their reputations to be soiled with this baseless charge of money laundering.

Small Group Training by PASTOR SCOTT

The secret to growing in your faith, developing Christian relationships and strengthening a church is small groups. Lenten Micro Prayer Group by PASTOR RYAN

I want to invite you to join in this year's Lenten Devotion, 40 days of prayer with Micro Groups.

Lent is the time of year we refocus on Christ and invite spiritual practices that will aid us to that cause. Each person's spiritual journey is in their own hands; as a pastor I can only lead you to the water, I can't make you drink. Prayer and devotion are two of the most impactful steps we can take to deepen our relationship with our Lord.

Many of those who had joined in the 100 Days of Prayer previously reported a very positive experience. The Holy Spirit connected people and created situations that helped bond members in our church together. As a large church we can't meet everyone, and micro groups are a great way to share our life in Christ together and deepen that relationship.

This Lenten season we will be putting people into groups of the same gender. We learned from the 100 Days of Prayer some good lessons. This shift will facilitate intimate and candid conversation. Honest and earnest conversation helps develop the relationships that mold our life in Christ.

We will use the Word-Share-Prayer method, specifically tailored to the Lenten season. This is a fabulous method because after the 40 days, you will have a tool that can be used in your private devotions or together with any size small group. The Word-Share-Prayer method is a powerful way to not only learn from the Bible but learn about each other. With its focus on connection and prayer for ourselves and others it is a powerful way to deepen our faith. Or, if you are a seasoned veteran, you can always bring a Bible study or devotion that you particularly like to your group.

The goal is that every day in Lent you would use the reading plan and pray. And, at least once a week you would meet with members of your micro group and share the Word and pray together.

April 2 • Table Manners

The body of Christ contains people of all economic and social strata, and yet we share in the same holy supper. When Paul hears of the Corinthians divisions at the table, he admonishes them to eat together in a worthy manner. In the banquet of life, is the church tending towards healing or feeding those divisions? 1 Corinthians 11:17-33; John 6:35

April 9 • My Gift is Better Than Yours!

Community works when we all contribute our gifts to the common good and the glory of God. Unfortunately, we can't help but evaluate one over the other. When the Corinthians get lost in their judgement over gifts, Paul reminds them, and us, that the greatest gift is love. 1 Corinthians 12-13; Luke 9:46-47


April 16 • Missing the Point

ABOUT THE PRAYER VIGIL

As we remember the heart-wrenching display of courage shown by our Lord, Jesus, on the evening of Maundy Thursday, we are reminded that Jesus spent His last hours as a free man praying to His Father in Heaven, Matthew 14:35 says that in the Garden of Gethsemane "...He fell on the ground & prayed..." and Luke 22:44 says, "And being in an agony He prayed more earnestly; and His sweat became like great drops of blood falling down upon the ground."

Every year, we are provided the opportunity to pray together as we remember the sufferings Christ endured for the sins of the world. We pray in 1-hr. shifts using prayer requests submitted by fellow members of the congregation. The Vigil begins in Lackey Chapel on Thursday, April 17 at 8 p.m. and ends at 7 p.m. on Good Friday before the start of our Tenebrae service.

First Communion 2025!

During the season of Lent, we begin preparing our 2nd-5th graders to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion for the first time!

We begin on March 9th where the kids learn how many sacraments are in the Lutheran Church as well as what makes Baptism and Communion sacraments. *Hint–there are 3 things!* Supplies to create First Communion banners are handed out at this event. Kids create a banner unique to them that is treasured for many years.

We move from sacramental theology to Story Day, where kids and parents follow Moses through the Exodus story in a very interactive and energetic way to learn the Passover story and how it connects to the Passion story.

The final class called "Livin Forgiven" is where we review what they have learned. The kids are able to taste the elements, receive a gift from the congregation, a blessing from their parents and leave their banners that will be hung up in Spirit Hall during the Seder Meal.

Serving in Western North Carolina

In mid-January, a team of six members from Christ Lutheran traveled to Watauga County and served residents who were impacted by the flooding following Hurricane Helene. The group partnered with the NC Baptists on Mission organization, which serves locals with ERR (Emergency Rapid Repairs) to their homes, in order to help get them out of temporary housing and back into their own homes as quickly as possible. With such a strong network of Baptist churches in the area, it made sense to partner with an organization that had a strong presence of "boots on the ground."

After traveling to Boone on Sunday afternoon, we checked into our housing and met other groups who

were also serving alongside us, including most notably a church youth group from Montana. An overnight snowfall of five inches delayed our dispatch on Monday morning, but we were finally sent out midday to a home in Sugar Grove, just west of Boone, located in a valley with an otherwise unintimidating creek that traveled through it. Upon reaching the house, which was a 3-bedroom structure built into a hill with a walkout basement, we immediately saw that this home had been flooded with 42 inches of water on the main level; the basement had been completely submerged. Miraculously, the home's foundation stayed intact and the structure was sound enough to rebuild and reoccupy. Our assignment was to install new drywall throughout the entire home's interior, as the mucking teams had removed all of the original 1970s wood paneling and insulation that was damaged in the flood. We completed as much as we could in four days, which included drywall installation, taping and mudding, and sanding in all but the two bathrooms of the house.









Something that was special to us was that we had the opportunity to meet the homeowner, who came by her home after work on a few of the days to say hello and thank us for our help. Her two brothers, also locals, would stop by occasionally to say hello and "inspect" our work, making sure their sister's home was being repaired properly.

I share this report with you for three reasons: first, to publicly thank the individuals who gave their time to help with these rebuilding efforts. Some of these people used PTO to take this trip, for which I am very grateful. Second, to thank the Benevolence team at Christ Lutheran for their financial support of our trip. Third, to highlight the importance of the ongoing need that the western portion of our great state has for repair work.

Whether or not you are skilled in building repairs, you can still volunteer to help and make a difference in the area. Please prayerfully consider getting involved with a service organization that makes a difference, and allow them to dispatch you to serve our fellow North Carolinians.

I also am grateful to Christ Lutheran for allowing me to step away from my work responsibilities to lead this trip.
