The Big Rocks

When Council met at the beginning of this year, they laid out their Big Rocks; that is, those major goals that they want to achieve by year end. Let me give you a brief update on seven of the eleven Big Rocks so we don't lose sight of our goals:

1. Good Soil Campaign: With the closing of Christ South, this capital campaign for the building of a worship center had to be revisited. We gave the 164 people who had made a commitment several options. About 25 members responded. Of the nearly \$800,000 received year to date:

a. Most chose to keep it in the fund, to be revisited when a new vision was presented. b.About \$40,000 was redirected towards their giving to the General Fund.

c. About \$56,000 was redirected towards another ministry such as Thrive, Music Ministry or the Endowment.

2. South Land: What are we going to do with that 12 acres of land? In April, the Council put together a task force to explore all the possibilities. The hope is that they will do their due diligence and provide a recommendation at the Annual Meeting in January of 2024.

3. Land Trust: We are deeply concerned about the lack of affordable housing in Charlotte, particularly with the community we serve at McClintock. We have a task force interviewing various organizations in Charlotte who are tackling this problem and seeing how we might partner with one of them.

4. Evangelism Strategy: Who is your one (maybe two!)? Who is that one person in your life that God has placed on your heart to invite to church, share your faith and plant the seed of Jesus? At the heart of the Gospel is to share the good news with others. So far, the stories of these one-on-one encounters is nothing less than miraculous.

5. A Kindergarten at Our Children's Center: This is not going to happen. The regulations and the physical changes to our facilities make this very difficult. We explored it and found it implausible.

6. Thrive Day School: This ministry to family and children with special needs is such a deep need in our community. Parents struggle with finding those schools and resources to help their children thrive. Thrive Day School currently is at three campuses, and Council is working with their board for long term viability.

7. Strategies for Capital Improvements: The carpeting and HVAC are ten years old. Walls need painting. We have a fountain that doesn't work. How will we prioritize these needed improvements for the future use of our well-used facilities? We have a team laying out a strategy and the finances to care for our buildings.

Each month the Council keeps these Big Rocks in front of us so we don't lose sight of our major goals for the year. I believe we have a strong Council who loves this church and works together well. I feel blessed to work so closely with these leaders.

April 16 • St. Stephen

St. Stephen was a waiter... literally. He served people, primarily the poor. But through his service, he met Jesus again, and his faith came alive. This was not a lukewarm faith with a half hearted commitment. Once you meet Jesus again, your life is never going to be the same. For St. Stephen, meeting Jesus again resulted in him having the dubious honor of being the first Christian martyr.

April 23 • The Ethiopian Eunuch

The Ethiopian Eunuch is an outsider. He is not of the same people group as the Jews in Canaan. He works as an official in a foreign power. He is wealthy enough to have his own scroll, but doesn't have a community to help him interpret what the Word is saying. Even this outsider has a place. The LORD sends Philip along a road who encounters this most out of place man. It doesn't take long for the Eunuch to be baptized and brought into the family of God.

April 30 • Paul's Conversion

Paul was a zealot of the law. Blameless. Born of the right family. Raised in the right manner. Living a life or prestige and honor. And all of it is worthless compared to Jesus. When Paul encountered the risen Lord, everything, *everything*, changed. Friends became enemies. Valuables became worthless. Even living might invite death, and for Paul there's no other way.

May 7 • Peter's Vision

HELLO my name is-

"Those people" are not welcomed here. "Those people" are not like us. Peter wrestles with the notion of who is in and who is out. The classic description of the Jewish people doesn't hold true for Peter and the new Christian movement. The goal is no longer to live so that we can say that we have made ourselves righteous in the sight of the LORD; but rather, live so that others may say we serve a righteous God.

May 14 • All, The Gentiles

Do you have the right thoughts (orthodoxy)? No? Well, then we can't possibly have anything in common. Did you really vote for that political party? I do apologize, we simply can't be seen together. We have always found ways of creating lines to exclude. But God did the very best to show us that He loves us all. One of the biggest struggles in our faith journey is that there are other people on the Way with us.

May 21 • Covering All the Bases

Science is not an affront to God. Being intellectual is not a sin, as being ignorant is not a virtue. The LORD God is not contained within the limits of human understanding. When we think we have covered all the bases and God is finally under our control, He does a new thing. We cannot begin to fathom all that is infinite and, yet, He sends His son to us that He is well known.

The Wise Men Followed One Star. We Follow Five Star (Reviews) by PASTOR RYAN

How do you know if something is good?

Well, if God said so then it is. But what if it's sushi? Where is the best sushi in town? Or a mechanic? Or how do you know if the driver of your Uber is safe and the car is clean? The answer these days is that we look at the reviews. We all do it. We go looking for a place to get new tires, for example, and Google to find places. Then we read reviews and pick the winner. If there is a Google entry that doesn't have any reviews, or maybe, like two or three, we probably skip that place looking for something more established.

Churches are no different. When we move into a new area, we Google churches and see which ones are good. And, like every other search, we look at the reviews to try and discern which are going to be the churches we will visit, and ultimately like. Which are the ones that have people telling us that there is good music, a welcoming atmosphere, biblical preaching or a place for our children to be fed with the Word?

At Christ Lutheran we don't have a lot of reviews on our Google entry. Considering how large of a congregation we are, we should have many, many reviews but we don't even have a couple dozen. Here is my call to action for you: WRITE A REVIEW!

Back in 2016, the ELCA voted as a denomination to create a new "roster" or office of leadership within the church and call them "Deacons." Prior to this decision, the ELCA had three lay-roster positions; Associate in Ministry (AIMs), Deacons, and Deaconesses. All three of these lay-rostered positions had different trainings and different educational processes and served within the church in different ways. People who had held these titles often served as church musicians, youth ministers, church administrators, service and outreach specialists, and even in faith-based social service organizations.

There were many reasons that the ELCA chose to combine these three lay-rosters into one. One of the reasons was to streamline and simplify the educational process, creating one standard for education. Another reason was none of our communion partners of other denominations (Presbyterian, Episcopalian, Methodist, etc.) had the three lay-rosters, but they do have Deacons! This allows for easier movement between denominations like our pastors have if they choose to do so. The reasons aren't as important, however, than what this shift in leadership does for our church and denomination moving forward.

With the vote in 2016 to combine the three lay-rosters into one and call them Deacons, the ELCA created a new way for people feeling called to ministry to express that calling. There are two "rosters" in the ELCA, now; Pastors who are called to Word and Sacrament and Deacons who are called to Word and Service. A Pastor's education is a Masters in Divinity with 3 years of course work and a yearlong internship, while a Deacon's education is a Masters of Arts in Diaconal Ministry with 2 years of course work and a yearlong internship. Much of the course work is the same between the two. Deacon candidates go through the same process of discernment as Pastors, called candidacy, with the same review process. In 2019, the ELCA voted to use "ordination" as the entrance rite for Deacons, the same as Pastors with just slightly different wording since Deacons are called to service and not sacraments.

Ultimately, the biggest difference between Pastors and Deacons is their calling. Pastors are called to shepherd congregations, preach the word and administer the sacraments. Deacons are called to have one foot in the church and one foot in the world, bridging the gap between the two. Deacons are called to preach the word and serve those in need.

There is still much work to be done around this new roster but the potential for the church is incredible! If it weren't for this second roster, I don't believe I would have ever gotten to the point of recognizing my call as a Pastor. I am grateful for my first call as a Deacon and excited for the new calling on my life as a Pastor! If you are interested in learning more about Deacons, you know where to find me!

Thank you, RITI volunteers, for another successful season of hosting our housing-challenged neighbors. This season was the first coming out of the pandemic and the numbers picked up significantly from the 2021-22 season.

Across the RITI program, the number of individuals served this season was 663, up from just 282 last season (1367 pre-COVID 2019-2020). Christ Lutheran was one of 56 host churches in Charlotte, and we were able to provide 180 bed nights this season. CLC provided 10 beds each Thursday. The bed need across RITI averages 50-90 each evening, so our church home is a big part of the program. Because we can offer individual rooms, we are able to host many families, including children. Many of our guests are repeat guests, and they are so gracious... so thankful. This would not be possible without your support.

Thank you to those who set up and served dinner, those who made the lunches and breakfast, and our drivers. And a big shout out to our overnight hosts, chef Mike Wallace (your meals are famous), Marcia Row for managing our laundry and supplies, Gregg Huether, JW Ingram and Barbara West for your support! And thanks to Jones Dry Cleaning, for keeping our laundry cleaned for over 20 years at no cost to CLC!

Feed A Family by LISA HEIRIGS

First of all, we are overwhelmed and so thankful for the generosity of those who contribute to the Feed a Family fund. Thank you! We have been buying groceries with that money for over two years! It is currently feeding 31 families – one bag of groceries at a time. And groceries are so expensive right now! It is only because of you that we have continued since COVID with groceries for our families in need. Some need a little help and others need a lot; our families are varied. I get texts from families asking for certain food items, such as cooking oil and laundry detergent. We have taken some of these beautiful people home and are horrified by their living conditions.

Ms. Sawyer (MMS Social Worker) mentioned an increased need due to the decrease in SNAP benefits. You may have heard, the SNAP emergency allotments ended at the end of February. On average that means \$90 less per month for families. But it may be as high as \$250 less a month, according to an analysis by the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

Family Night 2022-2023 is a Wrap!

In our first full school year back into programming, our flagship program, McPIE Family Night, was back in full force. We continued to rebuild this school year and are confident in reaching even more McClintock families next year! While we are not back to pre-COVID attendance and club numbers yet, we are certainly happy with where we are!

Registration night during the first week of fall and spring gave students and families an opportunity to meet club leaders and choose an activity that met the interests of each participant. We had our usual spread of middle school clubs – Woodworking, Sketch Squad, Top Scot Chef, Men About Progress, Sports Drills and Ten80 Racing, but also added a few new clubs this year! We were excited to gain a few new volunteers with Hands 2 Heart, Zombie Robotics, Get Creative, Football and the return of Computer Building! We averaged over 65 middle school students each week in our evening clubs and another 10 during the afternoon, almost at pre-COVID numbers.

Younger siblings also had fun! Marsha, Rick and Debbie continue to dedicate their Tuesday evenings to our littlest participants. They certainly have fun "playing" during club time and also do fun activities like making treats, slime, cute gifts for the holidays and art projects. Our 3rd-5th grade students were treated to Coding during the fall and Art this spring! This was a nice change-up to what we typically had to offer this age group!

Adult participants had four club options during the fall and three during the spring. Both included ESL, which is heavily appreciated by many parents as McClintock's Hispanic demographic is nearing 45%. Getting Ahead and Women's Journey are Pathways Out of Poverty classes where parents bonded over similar situations and helped each other create a road to stability. This also gave parents opportunities to be loved on and supported by their leaders!

Our Meals Team is always ready to serve dinner with a smile! Whether it is fried chicken, lasagna, tacos, pulled chicken, salad or the beloved desserts, students and families are always happy to receive a warm meal for dinner! This year, we served an average of 150 meals per week!

Our team of School Store volunteers ensures each student is prepared for school with essential items like notebooks, ear buds, pens, sticky notes, markers and colored pencils. The store items are free for students. Eric, Barb and Janice were there almost weekly to help with this effort!

Overall, our McPIE team is happy with how this school year went. Rebuilding takes time and a good amount of patience. However, armed with an army of dedicated volunteers, this big feat was made small. We will continue brainstorming ideas of ways to improve for this coming school year and know we can only continue to grow from here!
