

- 2. Southland Task Force: To explore options for the land at Christ South, host Town Meetings and propose a single vision for congregational approval and implementation by summer.



The Christ Lutheran Church Volunteer Team is officially scheduled for a Habitat construction project. Twelve volunteers will be needed to complete various framing punch list items on this new Habitat home (must be 16 or older). See ad on page 4 for details on how to register.

- 4. Develop Intentional and Diverse Marketing, Evangelism and Growth Plans for Targeted Audiences including Youth Ministry, Young Adults, Men's Ministry and our partnership with the Children's Center to better reflect our community demographics.
- 5. Quarterly Social/Fellowship/Congregational Events to foster relationships, encourage retention and further evangelism.
- 6. As Good Stewards, Leverage our Facilities and Assets for the Kingdom by creating a plan and timeline for campus/capital improvements and encouraging community use.
- 7. Plug into Larger Faith Community through partnership with other churches (Habitat, Service, Young Adults, etc) and para-church organizations such as F3, F4, Young Life, FCA, church league sports, TEC, etc.
- 8. Continue to Enhance Online Worship based on the results of the Online Survey which will be presented to Council on March 18.

# February 18 • Esther

Esther was a nobody. She was not born of a noble family. She possessed no great talents of leadership, wasn't a military strategist, and had mastered none of the arts. But when called upon to do what must be done, she mustered the bravery to stand in the gap. She advocated for her people & shows us that we all have a part to play, however humble our beginnings. --Esther 7:1-10; 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

#### February 25 • Nicodemus

Nicodemus was a Pharisee, which makes him a villain. Aren't all Pharisees evil? Weren't they all constantly seeking to trap Jesus and undermine His authority? While Nicodemus was, indeed, a Pharisee, he didn't exhibit the characteristics we so often associate with that ilk. Nicodemus was curious, a truth seeker. He came humbling to our Lord. He knew that God was active, and rather than writing Jesus off as an interloper, he sought out truth that would shake his worldview. --John 3:1-21; Micah 6:6-8

### March 3 • Cyrus of Persia

The Messiah is the one person God has anointed to lead His people. He is THE agent of the LORD. How can it be that the Prophet Isaiah calls Cyrus the King of Persia the Messiah!? The Messiah, or Christ (Messiah in Greek) is a very special person. Cyrus was just that. We think we understand what God is going to do. We think we know who God wants. We think there is a divine order that is completely understood. Cyrus the Polytheistic ruler of the blood thirsty

conquering nation of Persia is a villain. But of course, no one is just one thing, even "villains." We think we know God, but we should always be ready to see Him, in all people, in any place, and at any time.

--Isaiah 44:24-45:1: Matthew 9:9-13

#### March 10 · Joshua

Joshua was a hero of great faith. He and Caleb where undeterred about the Giants they saw in the land. It was an exceedingly good land and the LORD saw fit to give it to them. His faithfulness was in the minority, and because of it the Israelites wandered in the desert for 40 years. It can be hard to stand for what you know to be true; Joshua did it for generations. 40 years later, he finally walks into the land that was given to his people and is informed that the Israelites had a reputation that preceded them. A reputation that sapped the courage of the inhabitants. Our strength comes from the LORD and Joshua knew it. -- Joshua 2:9b-11; John 20:26-29

## March 17 • Centurion

Roman oppressors are not welcome among the Jewish people. To the Roman Imperial command, the Jewish people are nothing more than a trouble and tribute. Sometimes the mold is broken, as when a Centurion sought Jesus out to heal his servant. Jesus would have been right to point out all the evil Romans had done to God's Chosen people, but instead engages and shows us that the humility of even a Roman Villain can be edifying. -- Matthew 8:5-13; Philippians 2:6-11 and 25-29

# CLC Endowment Update by BRUCE VOELKER

Do you ever wonder how the Christ Lutheran Endowment funds are used? We often talk about how much is in the funds, or how they are invested, but too often forget to talk about the impact they have. The first of Christ Lutheran's Endowment funds is directly focused on having impact "Beyond these Walls," and our Benevolence Committee chooses how to spend the distribution from this fund (Fund I). In 2023, Fund I distributed \$31,190, and that money was directed toward the many ministries that our Benevolence supports including Crisis Assistance, A Roof Above, McClintock Partners in Education, and the ELCA Synod.

Our second fund (Fund II), is a general purpose fund that is allocated by Church Council to address unplanned expenses, which may include additional benevolence. In 2023, Fund II distributed \$14,469 to Council to use where most needed, which last year was earmarked for unplanned maintenance to our facilities.

In 2023, our endowment funds grew, with a 14% return on investment in each fund as well as contributions from church members and memorials given to the church. Given those results, in January 2024 the Endowment distributed \$31,424 from Fund I for use by Benevolence during this year, as well as \$16,656 from Fund II for use at Church Council to direct where it is most needed. We plan to acknowledge those who contribute to our Endowment through a recognition event on April 28, 2024.

As we move into 2024, the Endowment Committee will focus efforts on both managing the endowment funds and providing education and access to tools to church members regarding their estate planning. Whether estate plans benefit Christ Lutheran, other causes, or heirs, it is important to understand basic steps and techniques that can be used to have an estate work the way the grantor(s) envisioned. From the basics of wills to more advanced planning techniques, the Endowment Committee will work to make educational resources available to members of the congregation to assist them in their planning.



February 21 • The Joy of Pleasing the Father

The first step in maturing as a Christian is to remove the comma. Most of us simply say, "Please, God..." and then add a litany of requests to our prayers. By removing the comma, we reflect the Joy of Jesus with a life that wants to simply, "Please God." John 15:9-13; Hebrews 12:1-3

February 28 • The Exhaustion of the Daily Grind

We have so much to be thankful for. Compared to the suffering around the world, we have little to complain about. And yet, sometimes the people and the tasks and the pressure become overwhelming to the point of exhaustion when we try to be all things to all people. When you are pouring out more than you are drinking in, you experience the exhaustion that Jesus did during His many times of withdrawing to be refueled once again by God. Luke 5:12-16; Psalm 46

March 6 • The Compassion for Those Who Suffer

Oddly enough, while the world wants to know how many houses were built, how many meals were served and how many wells were dug, God is less interested in the numbers and more about the heart. With this emotion of compassion, we pray, "Let my heart break with what breaks Jesus' heart." This compassion begins by seeing each person in need not as a number or as a consequence of their sin, but as a child of God for whom Jesus died. Matthew 20:29-34; Hosea 11:1-4

### March 13 • The Frustration at the Dullness of Others


Keep Up! Our frustration is revealed in others when they do not get it, no matter how often it is explained or how much patience we give. Jesus also expressed this frustration with harsh words for his disciples who are slow witted and dull in their understanding. We can only hope it was a wake up call to Keep Up! Matthew 17:14-21 (John 3)

### March 20 · The Agony of Suffering

Jesus expressed the agony in the face of his impending suffering, even asking God to take the cup away. This kind of dread we experience ourselves with an upcoming chemotherapy or a difficult conversation or in the breakup of a relationship. Jesus is a high priest who understands all of our emotions—even this feeling of dread. Luke 22:40-44; Hebrew 4:14-16

### March 27 • The Anger at Hypocrisy and Injustice

There is such a thing as righteous anger. It is an anger that moves us within to act on behalf of others, to speak in the voice of injustice, and to confront the façade of hypocrisy. Jesus called out the whitewashed Pharisees, calling them snakes who will not escape hell (Matthew 23:33). He called false prophets ferocious wolves (Matthew 7:15). He turned over the money changers for taking advantage of the pilgrims (John 2:13-17). And He made no apologies.



#### ABOUT THE PRAYER VIGIL

As we remember the heart-wrenching display of courage shown by our Lord, Jesus, on the evening of Maundy Thursday, we are reminded that Jesus spent His last hours as a free man praying to His Father in Heaven. Matthew 14:35 says that in the Garden of Gethsemane "...He fell on the ground & prayed..." and Luke 22:44 says, "And being in an agony He prayed more earnestly; and His sweat became like great drops of blood falling down upon the ground."

Every year, we are provided the opportunity to pray together as we remember the sufferings Christ endured for the sins of the world. We pray in 1-hr. shifts using prayer requests submitted by fellow members of the congregation. The Vigil begins in Lackey Chapel on Thursday, March 28 at 8 p.m. and ends at 7 p.m. on Good Friday before the start of our Tenebrae service.

# God Works Through the Mess: Lessons from Joseph

OVERVIEW: Joseph's life is full of lessons from which we can learn how God works in and through the messiness of human life and sin. In a rollercoaster-life full of twists and turns, Joseph was far from perfect; yet God accomplished great things through him. In all of the ups and downs, God was there working for his good, and the good of all God's people. It helps us to remember that no matter what life throws at you, God can make it for your good, too.

## **April 7 • Dream Turned Nightmare**

Joseph was the favorite son of his father Jacob. This favoritism fueled jealousy among his brothers, and when Joseph shares his dream that they would one day bow down to him, it is too much. Planning to kill him, they sell him into slavery and he is taken to Egypt where he is a servant to an official in the Egyptian government. A dream of rule went extremely awry. How can any good come of this? --Genesis 37; Matthew 3:13, 16-17 or 27:1-4

### **April 14 • Not My Fault!**

God was with Joseph as he serves his master in Egypt. With great success, he is given greater responsibility and honor. However, trouble shortly follows when his master's wife accuses Joseph of impropriety. He was thrown into prison. Still, God was with him and continued to show him favor. In those times when we unjustly suffer the consequences, God is still working. --Genesis 39; Luke 23:47-49

### April 21 • Bluff an Interview?

While in prison, Joseph interprets the dreams of two of Pharaoh's servers. When Pharaoh has a dream no one can interpret, they bring Joseph to Pharaoh. He interprets the dream and convinces him that God is with him. Pharaoh puts him in charge of his palace, and from there, Joseph rises to the top, taking charge over the whole country. Was Joseph bluffing? Does that get us anywhere? --Genesis 40:41-46; Matthew 23:12-22

#### **April 28 • For Such a Time as This**

When Pharaoh gives Joseph charge of the land, he stores up grain during the seven years of plenty. When famine comes, there is more than enough to share. Joseph's provision of grain during the famine drew people from all over, including his own family! Because of his leadership, all of Egypt and the region are saved. When we are at the right time and the right place, it makes us wonder if it is pure coincidence. --Genesis 41:39-42:5; John 10:10

### May 5 • Saint and Sinner

Seeking food during the famine, Joseph's brothers travel from home to get grain from him, not knowing it is their brother—not to mention the one they sold into slavery. At first wanting revenge and giving them some difficulty, Joseph reveals himself to them and ultimately forgives them. In the mess of human hurt, God brings redemption in our relationships. --Genesis 42-45; Matthew 18:21-22

# May 12 • God in the Mess

Upon their father's death, Joseph's brothers are afraid of Joseph's revenge. They even throw themselves at his mercy, but Joseph tells them that while they planned evil against him, God used those same plans for his good. All along, in the mess, in the mistakes, in the twists and turns, God was working. In the end, it was all for the good. --Genesis 50:15-26; Luke 24:50-52



# Where Does the Money Go? by MICHELE WENZ

Have you ever wondered to whom Christ Lutheran Church (CLC) sends its Benevolence and Outreach funds? Have you ever wondered what are the mission and focus of these organizations and groups? Over the next year, the goal is to answer these questions so that we, the members of CLC, gain a better understanding of where the money is going and the impact it has in the Charlotte community and beyond.

For over a decade Christ Lutheran has directed 10% or more of the annual budget to Benevolence and Outreach. In addition to the budgeted funds, additional groups such as the Endowment Fund, Cornerstone Gifts and Thrivent Choice Dollars provide funds so that the amount available for disbursement increases.

Here is a brief recap of the 2023 Benevolent and Outreach funds distributions. The total amount distributed was \$346,500. The top four recipients were the NC Synod ELCA, McClintock Partners in Education (McPIE), Roof Above, and Crisis Assistance Ministries. Along with the top four recipients were additional groups that received funds as well– Charlotte Community Outreach, Charlotte Rescue Mission, Kairos Prison Ministries and Lutheran Services Carolinas. In addition to funds, multiple Outreach Ministries and small groups at CLC provided non-monetary support to organizations and groups that received funds, as well to others that did not. For a full listing please take a moment to read the 2023 Annual Report, pages 20-24.

We are all aware of various community challenges that exist in Charlotte, the surrounding communities and the nation. The following list of challenges are the ones that come immediately to mind for many people. They are not listed in order of importance because they are intertwined:

- -Homelessness;
- -Affordable housing;
- -Eradicating hunger;
- -Alleviation of poverty;
- -Support for family & children.

The organizations and groups that Christ Lutheran supports tackle these as well as other challenges with the monetary and non-monetary support they receive from CLC. Our support has a definite positive impact on various challenges facing our community.

#### **Our Mission**

Charlotte Bilingual Preschool's mission is to prepare Spanishspeaking children for success in school and life by providing superior dual language, multi-cultural early childhood education.

# **Community Need**

Over 30% of Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools (CMS) students identify as Latino. The latest 2022-23 report from CMS shows that only 14.7% of Hispanic students report as being "college and career ready," with only 70.8% graduating within four years last year, compared with CMS' overall graduation rate of 82.6%. In addition, The State of North Carolina is considered a childcare desert when it comes to infant and toddler care.

#### **Core Services**

**Preschool ages 3-5:** Through this 5-star licensed early education program, offered at little to no cost, children are immersed in a dual language, literacy-rich environment that prepares them for kindergarten and builds their English proficiency while leveraging the advantages of bilingualism and cultural diversity.

Family Programs: We offer programs to support families with children ages infant to 5. The goals of these programs are to support early literacy, cognitive and social-emotional growth and build a culturally relevant healthy home environment.

Workforce Development: To create a pipeline of bilingual educators, we partner with CPCC to offer Early Childhood Education classes in Spanish, on the weekends, to our families and Latino adults in our community. Through this partnership, we guide students through pathways to become credentialed educators.
