Having a funeral with only a handful of family members present has been hard— Oh, how I've missed you! Weddings that have had to be postponed after a year of planning— Oh, how I've missed you... No hugs, no handshakes, no pecks on the cheek, only a friendly face on Zoom or waving to one another across the street—Oh, how I've missed you!

I understand the necessity of social distancing and I believe that we have accomplished flattening the curve and saving lives. But that doesn't take away from missing being together. We are in the people gathering business! We are the Body of Christ, the Fellowship of Believers. And when we can't be together physically, there is a loss. Oh, how I've missed you!

And oh, how I've appreciated you!

The way that you've faithfully remained connected online even as we are apart. In one month, our reach has increased 644%! Oh, how I've appreciated you! The letters, emails and phone calls, "Just checking in on you, pastor," have been such a blessing. Oh, how I've appreciated you. While other churches are down in their giving by 30-50%, we closed out April having received about 102.5% year to date of our budgeted income! Oh, how I've appreciated you!

For all the positive pauses, people going out of their way to do small acts of kindness, speak words of comfort and remember those who are struggling has all been so heartwarming. Oh, how I've appreciated you!

These times bring out the worst in people in terms of hoarding, anxiety, fear, loneliness and depression. If there are any underlying issues within ourselves or with others, they are only heightened during this time of separation because we must deal with it in unhealthy ways. That is, in our solitude, surrounded by 24-hour news of compounding calamity, the demons come out with negative thoughts that spiral us downward in unhealthy ways.

But when we are together, we can find healthy ways to deal with these struggles either through activities, social engagement, mental health or human touch. If God is the God of community, then the devil is the god of isolation.

Oh, how I have missed you! And oh, how I've appreciated you! I look forward to that time soon that we can gather together once again, share a handshake and a hug. Be close to one another. To hold hands in prayer. As the song goes, "Soon and very soon..."

Just not yet. But when that day comes, it will be a glorious day with the saints on earth below and with the saints in heaven above giving thanks that the Body of Christ is once again where it should be – together.

### **Phasing Back into Normal**

Each of us knows that long term planning these days is about three days out. Every time we try to put something on the calendar, the government moves the goalposts out a few more weeks. It makes it nearly impossible to plan.

The leadership of the church is eager to get us up and going again with programs and worship. But we also want to do it in a safe and responsible manner. ## **Next Steps for Christ South**

It is so hard to plan these days with guidelines slow in coming and changing by the day. While Concord and Providence campuses look forward to that time of gathering back together for physical worship, South finds itself in a predicament. CMS has been less than clear when or even if they are going to allow us to return to Polo Ridge Elementary School to resume worship.

### So what's the plan?

Online worship has worked well for all three campuses. In fact, we were well poised with our online technology and online minister before COVID hit. While this will continue for all three campuses, we have had to make some decisions regarding Christ South worship.

Towards that end, the Executive Committee met with Pastor Matt and has approved submitting to the town of Weddington a plan to erect a large, steel building and gravel parking space on our property on Rea Road. There are still many details to work out including sewer, pricing, timeline, permitting, imperviable ground, etc., but we think it is a wise decision to get onto that land sooner than later. At this point, it is a plan. As this moves forward, we will certainly keep the congregation apprised of the progress.

This virus has forced us to rethink the way we do church. May God's Spirit lead us to make those decisions that make the greatest impact for the Kingdom of God.

every animal is available). Scroll down to "Meet a life-size bear up close" and click on "View in 3D" and then be prepared to see the animal right there in your very own home. Try it!












# McPIE Take-Home-Challenges by LISA HEIRIGS

The students have enough to build an impressive tower. One mom commented on my Instagram post this week, "My girls love Tuesdays because of you!" We are impressed and amazed by what the students create each week. But this week, our hearts melted.

My son, Donald, is presently working at the American Embassy in Bucharest, Romania as the Secret Service Agent in charge of the office. After the CDC announced that we should all be wearing masks, I saw the need to make one for my husband and myself. When speaking with my son in Romania, he shared that masks were not available there – nor is hand sanitizer. Because the healthcare is so poor in Romania, I felt the call to make a batch of masks to send to him for his protection and some additional masks for others at the Embassy. Every few days I mail another batch to him for distribution in Bucharest. I understand that the Ambassador and his staff are all wearing the American Flag masks that I have made.

Being a retired nurse, I refused to try to order N95 masks because I knew how badly the medical community

would need them. I searched for vacuum HEPA filters unsuccessfully, however found I could order them online. I made masks for my neighbors and gals with whom I play golf and bridge, for Christ Lutheran, the Carolina Clown organization and nurses in Tampa, FL pediatrics (Lisa Carrigan's daughter). I am merely being the hands and feet of Christ during this unprecedented time.











## The Moore Sweatshop by ANNA MOORE

We have a room in our home that we jokingly call The Moore Sweat Shop. This is where for several years, we have worked on producing pillows for breast cancer patients. Here we cut our fabric, sew the pieces together and stuff the pillows with fiber.

Then several faithful volunteers take the pillows and complete the process. These pillows are taken to nurse navigators at four local hospitals. Some of our friends at Christ Lutheran have received one of these pillows.

During this time of sheltering at home we have been able to produce quite a surplus of pillows. We now have close to 600 ready to be delivered. We are actually delivering 150 pillows today, using the appropriate distancing! It was good to have a purpose for our days rather than sitting around wondering what we could do. We pray for the day that these pillows are no longer needed.

Then we got a call. There was another need. Pillow production came to a halt when we got the word that masks were needed for our CLC congregants. We were indeed sorry that masks were needed but we now had another purpose for our days. As we worked together we remarked that working on these masks actually brought joy to us, as we had a reason to get up in the morning with something to occupy the empty hours at home. We hope that these masks have made daily living easier for those who have received them.

It is our hope that the work of our hands will bring hope to those who receive a pillow or a mask. All of these are made with the prayer that God will bless the recipient.

# Groceries & Heat-and-Eat Meals by LISA HEIRIGS

As of this writing, we are currently making 70 grocery bags to be handed out Tuesday and Friday at McClintock Middle School and Wednesday with the delivery of the Heat-and-Eat meals. Filling 70 grocery bags requires a lot of canned meat and cereal, but also macaroni and cheese, vegetables and fruit and toilet paper. Two-day delivery times are laughable. When we started, we needed 20 bags and all I had was tuna and cereal. In a Monday afternoon McPIE Board meeting, the Board was expecting a large number of bags because I had spent a lot of money, but all I had was five bags. I told them that I needed my Costco order, which had macaroni and cheese and green beans, but really I needed toilet paper and fruit, too. Early the next morning, imagine my surprise when I opened the donation bin and it was full of everything I was missing!!! I was dumbfounded, but so so grateful to the God who provides and the Holy Spirit who inspires. He is Good!!!

For the grocery bags on another week, we needed potatoes and carrots to go with two dozen radishes from Lydia. I went to Costco and bought 45 lbs. of potatoes and 30 lbs. of carrots and filled my cart with canned fruit, vegetables, mac & cheese, cereal and my single limits of canned meat. Driving to church, I wondered how we will gather enough food, given the limits on canned meat and cleaning supplies, to provide the bags



at McClintock Middle School. As I unload my truck and roll the potato and carrot laden cart to the CLCC, I look in the bins and they are full. The gardeners dropped off lettuce, baby kale and parsley along with Lydia's radishes. Kate had dropped off a load of groceries and perishables, and Dana & Madi delivered a truck full of canned meat and beef stew. And I am reminded of who is in charge because it is certainly not me! He Provides!!!

Lastly, on Wednesdays for several weeks now we have provided Heat-and-Eat meals for some of our Christ Providence/McPIE struggling families. Last week was the first week that we provided a bag of groceries with that meal. Our hearts were full of joy to surprise our families with a bag of groceries. In turn, some of the comments from the families included: "Thank y'all for always thinking of my family!", "Y'all are such a blessing", "I don't know what my family would do with out your help!", and finally "Tell everyone we are very thankful. Y'all are really angels!" One bag of groceries = joy, thankfulness and blessings for all. A rich ROI!!
