

The Marks of Discipleship

We know what it means to be a disciple from the inside; that is, to believe in Jesus as Lord, receive the forgiveness of our sins and put our trust in God's grace alone. But what does a Christian look like on the outside? That is going to be the emphasis of our Lenten Journey.

Sadly, when it comes to things like divorce, illness, bankruptcy, alcoholism and all the other vices, statistically there is not a huge difference between professing Christians and the rest of society. But there are some outward signs to see that during Lent we call, **"The Marks of Discipleship."**

Worship: It is the most important thing that we do as believers, set aside that time to come into the presence of God with his children and praise his holy name.
Love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and strength and mind.

Devotion: We set aside time to be alone with the word of God and to pray, deepening and nurturing that real and personal relationship with God.
Jesus went alone to a lonely place to pray.

People: We were created to be in community with other believers. Fellowship is not a side effect of church, it is one of the Marks of Discipleship.
Bear one another's burdens.

Service: For the believer, service is a non-negotiable Mark of Discipleship. We serve those in need to be the hands and feet of Jesus.
For the Son of Man came not to be served, but to serve.

Stuff: What's stuff? It's divorce, illness, heartache, addiction, bankruptcy. Stuff happens, and will happen. More importantly, however, is how our faith gives us strength and hope to persevere.
In this world you will have trouble, but take heart, for I have overcome the world.

You can join us during Lent to discover and do the Marks of Discipleship three ways:

1. Attend worship with each Sunday focusing on a different Mark of Discipleship;
2. We will have in the bulletin a daily devotion for you each week on one of the Marks;
3. Join the pastors in Fellowship Hall on Sundays during Lent for a study on each of the Marks.

What does it look like to be a Christian? You can't tell by a person's ethnic background or citizenship. It is not recognized by your age or gender or hair color. And no one can judge another's heart. But you can see the Marks of Discipleship in one who lives out their faith for others to see and to the Glory of God.

Join us this Lent in making these Marks real and powerful for you.

Lenten Sunday Series

FEBRUARY 22 - MARCH 22

The Marks of Discipleship



Overview: What does a follower of Jesus look like? You certainly can't tell by outward appearance, ethnic background or family heritage. God is always about the heart of the believer which the Bible characterizes with these Marks of Discipleship.

February 22 • Worship

We have said often that the most important thing that we do is worship. In that weekly gathering, the saints gather with other brothers and sisters in Christ to praise God's holy name, hear his Word and share in the sacraments. Every other Mark of Discipleship flows from the greatest commandment to love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and strength and mind.

Mark 12:24–34; Hebrews 10:19–25

March 1 • Devotion

Can you imagine having a close, personal and intimate relationship with your spouse if you never carve out time alone? The same is true with our relationship with God. During his busiest times, Jesus often carved out time to be alone with God in prayer, reflection and devotion. This Mark of Discipleship draws us into a deeper and personal love relationship with God.

Luke 5:15–16; Psalm 92:1–8

March 8 • People

We were never created to go it alone. Our Christian identity has always been marked by living in community

with other believers. Fellowship is the place to share life together, receive honest feedback, experience grace, engage in faithful living and enjoy the blessings of life. Over 50 times in the New Testament we are called to be together and lift up one another. *John 15*

March 15 • Service

For the believer, service is a non-negotiable Mark of Discipleship. Jesus made that abundantly clear as he used himself as the example. "The Son of Man came not to be served, but to serve and to give his life as a ransom to others." You don't have to do everything, but you have to do something — something that flows from faith, something that asks nothing in return, something for no recognition. So, what is your something?

Matthew 25:31–45; Philippians 2:1–11

March 22 • Stuff

Stuff happens — divorce, illness, heartache, addictions, bankruptcy — stuff happens. For Christians, perhaps even more so. The world, the devil and all the empty promises run completely counter to the Gospel. Jesus warned his followers, "In this world, you will have troubles." But then he gives this word of encouragement, "But take heart for I have overcome the world!" This Mark of Discipleship is not whether or not stuff happens, but how our faith gives us strength and hope to meet the days ahead.



Adding During Lent

The Church year once again brings us to the season of Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday. For me, Lent and the changing of seasons go hand-in-hand. Nature reawakens after winter, with plants



blossoming and animals returning from their rest. Lent's place in the forty days before Easter — the Resurrection of our Lord — seems most appropriate as we, especially in the Carolinas, welcome Spring and enjoy a feast for the senses as we shed off the cold of winter.

I do believe that it is not before the penitential time of Lent, however, that the Christian can fully appreciate the joy and celebration of Easter. Lent is a period of time which is traditionally marked with less. Less singing, for we tend to omit "gloria's" and "alleluia's" in

many of our worship services. Less celebration, for our sanctuary is presented with the striking and somewhat imposing Corpus Christi ("body of Christ") carving that hangs before the cross. Less decoration, as we near the conclusion of Lent with the stripping of the altar on Maundy Thursday.

Some faiths, in particular Catholicism, often mandate a reduced choice of food for its believers, necessitating the seasonally appropriate Bojangler fish sandwich (I'll pass, thanks). I have friends who will sometimes give up something for Lent, in order to help remind them of Christ's sacrifice and what He gave up in order that you and I would be saved.

Rather than giving up something this year, may I suggest you consider adding something for Lent that strengthens your faith and the faith of those around you. Adding a daily devotion, prayers before mealtime with your family, singing or Bible time with your children, calling or writing to a friend or family member, attending worship more regularly... the decision is yours.

Since I proposed adding something, here's something specific to add. Join us on Wednesdays at noon in Christ Chapel for our midweek Lent services, beginning on Ash Wednesday (February 18) and concluding on April 1. They are a refreshing, and brief, service of Word, Meal and music. Lunch is served afterwards in the Forum. It's a refreshing and, I think, a much-needed pause in the middle of the week. I hope you'll join us.

Easter Wreaths

This year, in addition to purchasing lilies or hydrangeas in memory or in honor of loved ones, you can also sponsor an Easter floral wreath that will help to decorate the church for the Resurrection of our Lord! These locally-crafted wreaths, featuring artificial foliage for long-lasting beauty, will adorn our sanctuary doors and Easter Sunrise service, and then be available for you to take home after the Easter Sunday Contemporary service.

Wreaths are \$75. There are two choices of wreath: both the Peony and Yellow wreaths can be commissioned in memory or in honor of a loved one. The deadline for commissions to be included in the bulletin is March 23.

“The Least of These”

Wednesday, February 25 • Rahab

It is called the world's oldest profession, but rarely does anyone aspire to work in it. It is always out of desperation, abuse and need. But God wants Rahab to rescue two Israelite spies, provide inside information on the conquest of Jericho and was rewarded for her faith and courage. Who would have guessed that this prostitute, the least of these, would be named in the family tree of Jesus? *Joshua 2:1-11; Matthew 1:1-6*

Wednesday, March 4 • Jonathan

The relationship between David and Jonathan has been used often as an example of a deep friendship. What many don't know is that without Jonathan risking his life to protect his friend, David would never have become the most beloved king in Israel's history. Jonathan's story is brief, it is rarely told, but God used this relationship to change the course of Israel's history. *1 Samuel 20:1-17*

Wednesday, March 11 • Ananias

We hear the words of Jesus to love and pray for our enemies, but has that ever been put to the test in your life? Enter Ananias. As the early Christian Church began to emerge, they were under constant threat of imprisonment and death from both Rome and the Jews. Leading this charge for the Jews was an angry, ruthless Pharisee by the name of Paul. But when God confronted Paul on the road to Damascus, He led him to a faithful man named Ananias who had to make a hard decision: Do I put the words of Jesus into action? Do I love my enemy... really? *Acts 9:1-19*

Wednesday, March 18 • The Man of Macedonia

Sometimes the “least of these” is such a minor character, that they don't even have a name. During one of Paul's missionary journeys, they were experiencing hardship and uncertainty on where to proceed. Each path they took became an obstacle they could not overcome, until an unnamed man from Macedonia came in a vision giving Paul and his team clarity and unity as to the path they must go. *Acts 16:6-10*

Wednesday, March 25 • Phoebe

Love that name, Phoebe. Where does it come from? A 1950's movie? A soap opera? Phoebe is actually part of the least of these, a cameo appearance of a woman in the Bible who is probably directly responsible for the growth and encouragement of the Christian Church in Rome. Though only briefly mentioned, the meaning of her name, Phoebe says it all, “Bright and Radiant.” *Romans 16:1-2*


Wednesday, April 1 • Onesimus

Onesimus. Was that on your list of potential baby names? Probably not, but this “least of these,” has a brief but rich history with Paul. Onesimus was a runaway slave after stealing something from his master, Philemon. His encounter with Paul transformed him into a beloved companion and reminds each of us that no one is beyond God's redemption. *Philemon 8-18*

ABOUT THE PRAYER VIGIL

As we remember the heart-wrenching display of courage shown by our Lord, Jesus, on the evening of Maundy Thursday, we are reminded that Jesus spent His last hours as a free man praying to His Father in Heaven. Matthew 14:35 says that in the Garden of Gethsemane “...He fell on the ground & prayed...” and Luke 22:44 says, “And being in an agony He prayed more earnestly; and His sweat became like great drops of blood falling down upon the ground.”

Every year, we are provided the opportunity to pray together as we remember the sufferings Christ endured for the sins of the world. We pray in 1-hr. shifts using prayer requests submitted by fellow members of the congregation. The Vigil begins in Lackey Chapel on Maundy Thursday at 8 p.m. and ends at 7 p.m. on Good Friday before the start of our Tenebrae service.

With shifts throughout the night, many volunteers are needed. Sign up for a 1-hr. time slot by filling in your name on the signup board in the Lower Commons. Opening prayers & devotionals with pertinent scripture will be made available to assist the prayer volunteers as needed.

Good Friday Family Service

Families with young children are invited to attend this meaningful and family-oriented Good Friday Worship Service on Friday, April 3 at 10:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary. This service is designed for families to come together in interactive learning and reflection as we remember the significance of Good Friday. Through a Gospel-centered message, we will focus on the hope, grace and redemption made possible through Jesus' sacrifice. The service will be engaging and accessible for children, creating space for families to experience this sacred day side by side.

As part of the worship service, students will have the opportunity to participate in interactive stations that share about the events of Jesus' last day. Each station is thoughtfully designed to help learn and engage in tangible ways, highlighting the depth of Christ's love and the power of God's redeeming grace. We invite you to bring your children and join us for this powerful morning of remembrance, discovery and worship as we prepare our hearts for Easter.

Maundy Thursday's Seder Meal

What is the Seder Meal and why do we reenact it on Maundy Thursday? Good question! The Seder Meal is a remembrance of the plagues and suffering of the Israelite slaves in Egypt. By sacrificing a lamb and painting its blood on their doorways, the angel of death passed over their homes and families.

How does this connect to Jesus? When John the Baptist cries out "Here comes the Lamb of God" when Jesus walks by, it signals that the true and final Passover Lamb has come. The gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke tell us the last meal Jesus had before going to the cross was the Passover meal He celebrated with His disciples. In this meal, Jesus took bread and wine and gave them new meaning: "This is my body... this is my blood." Jesus fulfills the Passover by becoming both the host and the Lamb whose body and blood delivers us from sin. As the Seder Meal proclaims "This is what the LORD did for me," the Lord's Supper proclaims Christ's sacrifice given "for you." Jesus fulfills God's promise of deliverance in him, we are forgiven of all our sins and given true life.

We celebrate this special meal to remind ourselves of our rich tradition of God's action and promise in the lives of his people and in the 2nd graders He is calling to the Lord's table of mercy.

First Communion 2026!


